The meeting was opened in due form by Richard O'Riskey, Deputy County Sheriff and the meeting was called to order by Otto P. Niethammer, President of the Council.

Thereupon the County Auditor read the Ordinance for 1969 budgets for the second time, which are in the words and figures following, to-wit:

### ORDINANCE FOR APPROPRIATIONS

Section I- Be it ordained by the County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana: That for the expenses of the County Government and its institutions for the year ending December 31, 1969, the following sums of money are hereby appropriated and ordered set apart out of the several funds herein named and for the purposes herein specified, subject to the laws governing the same. Such sums herein appropriated shall be held to include all expenditures authorized to be made during the year, unless otherwise expressly stipulated and provided by law. Provided, however, that disbursements from each appropriation made are further limited to the amounts listed for the detail accounts making up such appropriation unless said detail accounts are increased or decreased by another ordinance or resolution of the County Council. (If one or more of the detail accounts within an appropriation for an office or department are increased by not more than the total amount that one or more other detail accounts within the same appropriation are concurrently decreased by ordinance or resolution of the County Council, neither advertising to the taxpayers nor approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners is required. Other changes affecting more than one appropriation for a department or office or appropriation changes affecting more than one department or office within a fund require

advertising, additional appropriation ordinance and approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners.)

Section II. That for the said fiscal year there is hereby appropriated out of the County General Fund the following:

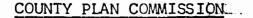

An Ordinance Levying Taxes and fixing the Rate of Taxation for the surger purpose of raising revenue to meet the necessary expense of the County Government and its Institutions for the calendar year 1969.

Be It Ordained by the Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, That:

Section 1. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of 5.3 cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 4. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Levee Authority District Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of 8.7 cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of. said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Levee Authority District Fund in the County Treasurer.

Section 3A. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Cumulative Building Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of Two Cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Zirport Authority District Cumulative Building Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 5A. For the use and benefit of the Poor Relief Bond Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of Various Cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of the respective Townships of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the Poor Relief Fund in the County Treasury.

For the use and benefit of the Cumulative Bridge Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of 15 Cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the Cumulative Bridge Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 6. For the use and benefit of the County Welfare Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1968, collectible in the year 1969, the sum of 80.9 Cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected, shall be paid into the County Welfare Fund in the County Treasury.

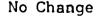

Dear Mr. Taylor:

In order that there be no misunderstanding as to the position of the Board of Directors concerning construction completion and rental payments from the governmental units for space in the nex Complex, it is deemed advisable to restate the pertinent point presented in our appearance before your Board on Tuesday, September 10, 1968.

- 1. According to the best information available to us from the Architect and General Contractor, the buildings will be completed and ready for occupancy on or about December 30, 1968.
- 2. The lease executed by the City, County and School Corporation, as Lessees, provides in part as follows:

## "Section 3.01. Fixed Annual Rentals"

... The first installment of the fixed annual rentals payable by the City, County and School Corporation, respectively, shall be due on the date that the said governmental buildings are completed and ready for occupancy, and shall be in an amount pro-rated, on the basis of the yearly rate applicable to such governmental unit, from the date of completion to the thirtieth day of June or December, as the case may be, followsuch date of completion. Thereafter, the fixed annual rentals shall be payable in advance by each of such governmental units in equal semiannual installments, figured on the basis of the yearly rate applicable to such governmental unit, on the thirtieth days of June and December of each year, during the term of this lease ....

#### "Section 3.02. Additional Rentals."

... The City, County and School Corporation shall pay as additional rentals amounts sufficient to reimburse the Authority for the reasonable cost of efficient operation and normal maintenance of their respective governmental buildings ....

### "Section 3.03. Annual Budget of Authority"

... The Authority shall, on or before June 15 of each year commencing with the year 1967, prepare and adopt a budget in which it shall set forth in reasonable detail its estimated operation and maintenance expenses for the next calendar year, and shall immediately transmit a copy thereof to the City, County and School Corporation respectively.

.. The budget shall specify the amounts which the City, County and School Corporation, respectively. shall be required to pay as additional rental to cover its share of the operation and maintenance costs during the fiscal year for which the budget is prepared. The City, County and School Corporation shall include in their respective budgets adopted in 1967, for the next calender year, and in their budgets adopted in each year thereafter, amounts sufficient to pay their total annual rental obligations under this lease, including both the fixed annual rentals under Section 3.01 and the additional rentals under Section 3.02, payable during such year. The City, County and School Corporation, respectively, shall levy annually a tax sufficient to produce each year the necessary funds with which to pay the annual rentals provided for herein....

3. The Building Authority is obligated to recognize a dual responsabibility: first, to the Bondholders who provided the construction financing and, secondly, to the Lessees who will be the tenants when the complex is occupied.

It is believed that the above information will give you a clear picture of the responsibilities of the Governmental Leaseholders and the Building Authority.

Under Fiscal & Administration, identified as Account 983-Social Security from \$15,000 to \$13,300-- a reduction of \$1700.

## WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1968

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Taylor at 9:20 A.M. A11 members except Mr. Morris, Mr. Davidson and Mr. Diekmann, were present.

## REVIEW OF BUDGETS-CONTINUED

It was the concensus of the Board to again review the Sheriff's budget.

### COUNTY SHERIFF

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Motion was made by Mr. Wittgen, seconded by Mr. Woehler, that Account 102E\*Probationary Patrolmen be reduced in number from 12 to 10, which will reflect a reduction of \$6000 in this Account.

Total of 102 Account reduced from \$300,600 to \$294,600.

Motion carried.

Reason: Further reduction is because the members of Tax Adjustment Board feels that after moving to the Civic Center Complex, the Sheriff's Department will not need the amount as budgeted, because the Sheriff will receive additional help from the City Police Department in the performance of these services.

#### VANDERBURGH COUNTY AUDITORIUM

Mr. Woehler made a motion that Account 103-Extra Help, be reduced from \$30,000 to \$27,000 -- a reduction of \$3000.

Mr. Wittgen seconded the motion, and motion carried.

Motion was made by Mr. Guy Nicholson, seconded by Mr. George Woehler, that the following resolution be adopted, and made a part of minutes of 1968 Tax Adjustment Board.

## TAX ADJUSTMENT BOARD PROPOSED RESOLUTION

Having completed our review of all local budgets as presented in regular session on September 9, 1968, it is our considered opinion that local property taxes and other forms of taxation, cannot continue to increase without materially jeopardizing our free enterprise system. Property owners are reaching the limits of capacity and endurance under present levies.

There is a large and growing number of our citizens living on fixed or limited incomes, who cannot afford higher taxes. also, unabated tax pressures are reaching detrimental levels with respect to business and industrial development potentials.

Admotion was made by Guy Nicholson and seconded by George Woehler, whereby the following resolution be adopted and made a part of the 1968 minutes of the Vanderburgh County Tax Adjustment Board:

## RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, That this Board, as a legally appointed Body representing all taxpayers of Vanderburgh County, in establishing a fair and equitable rate of taxation on real and personal property, do hereby recommend that a vital and necessary program be commenced immediately, to achieve greater efficiency in local government through sound business methods for the welfare of the entire community.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That this Board act as a committee to solicit the support and sponsorship for such action from the Mayor, City Council, County Council, County Commissioners, School Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, Evansville Industrial Foundation, Evansville's Future, League of Women Voters, News Media, and all other civic organizations and citizens, and that a copy of this resolution be mailed to the above named governmental bodies, and other interested parties referred to in this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That such a program should include, but not be limited to consideration of such governmental office consolidations as are presently permitted by law, the development of legislation to permit additional consolidation of services, establishment of a County-wide department of purchasing for all local governmental units, consideration of new budget accounting forms, and a comprehensive study of manpower and skill requirements in all local governmental offices.

This will confirm the discussion we had in the meeting Friday, at which time we advised you that we could substantially complete work on all three buildings, subject to a punch list, by December 31,1968. This advice was given with the enderstanding that:

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of Indiana limit the total of all tax rates on property within any Municipal Corporation for all Municipal Corporations, which the property therein is taxable, except in certain instances ro One Dollar and Twenty-five (\$1.25) Cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property therein, in territories outside of the corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Towns, and limits the rate of Two Dollars (\$2.00) on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in territories inside corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Towns; And,

WHEREAS, said Board has endeavored to limit the aggregate of the tax rates in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the State of Indiana; And,

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to, and in conformity with said laws, we do hereby revise, change and reduce said budgets and fix and determine the tax levies of the following Municipal Corporations of Vanderburgh County, in the State of Indiana, as follows:

Dear Senator Orr:

The general consensus within the community favors local review of the budget of the Evansville Vanderburgh County Building Authority. At its meeting on this date, the County Council-unanimously adopted a resolution supporting local review. -This position had previously been approved by the County Commissioners. Further,

the Building Authority does not object to this amendment.

Local review can be obtained by submission of the Building Authority's operating budget to the County Tax adjustment Board and, thereafter, the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

Specifically this would require an ammendment of that section dealing with the levy of taxes (acts of 1937, Chapter 119, sec. 2 and Burns 64-1905 and the amendment of the Acts of 1953, Chapter 54, section 19, Burns 26-2519), which is the section dealing with Building Authority.

Section 64-1905 should be amended by inserting the words "building authority" after the words "park district".

Section 26-2519 should be amended by adding a new paragraph which can be numbered section 19a of the Building Authority Act. The new paragraph should provide substantially as follows:

> "The annual operating budget of any building authority shall be subject to review by the County Board of Tax adjustment of the County in which the said building authority is located, and thereafter by the State Board of Tax Commissioners as in the case of other tax levying units of Government".

We would suggest that you check Legislative Reference Bureau in order to determine that we have used the most desirable language to obtain the results which we desire.

Mr. O'Day noted that next year is an election year again and that will also put more work on the Clerk's Office.

When asked about St. Joe County as to how much they pay their Chief Deputy, Mr. O'Day explained that they pay another Supervisor \$7,000 a year just to supervise the extra work.....whereas, he is asking \$3,000 per year raise for his chief deputy.

### PIGEON TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Maynard Rogers, Pigeon Twp,, Assessor appeared to explain his need for the following requests:

Mr. Rogers explained that he needs the additional help because of the reassessment....that he has already sent out 5000 reassessment notices that will have to be done over plus all the others that had not been done. As to the equipment it needed repair and is now fixed.

County Auditor, Lewis Volpe, said that he had given the assessor extra help, and tried in every way to help speed up their work and now the Pigeon Assessor is taking away 5000 notices that the Auditor's Office already had done, which will have to be done over. He said "Vanderburgh County will go bankrupt unless tax bills can be got out on time."

The Auditor also noted that his office is six months behind now and will have to use two shifts and possibly three in order to have the tax bills out on time next year.

### CIRCUIT COURT

Judge, William Miller, appeared to explain that they need money to pay jurors. He reported that they will have forty jury trials this year.

COUNTY ASSESSOR

Horace Lukens, County Assessor offered the Pigeon Assessor help from his office.

 $\underline{\tt Lr}$ . Lukens reported that it will take \$100,000 for Reassessment. This is not including the extra work for each office.

There are "Sales Ratio Study" copies available in his office to any one who would like to look at them.

### COUNTY ASSESSOR (CONT'D)

Mr. Lukens said that the deputies the County Assessor asked for were rejected by State Tax Board. Mrs. Mooney suggested that something should have been done earlier in the year.

### COUNTY HOME

Albert Breedlove, County Home Supt., appeared to explain the need for additional money to pay the electric, water and gas. He explained the bill runs from \$725 to \$750 per month... with a balance left in that account of only \$1,302.

The Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, met this 3rd day of September, 1969 at 8:00 a.m., with the following members present: William J. Brune, President, Paul Kinney, Robert Lutz, Gilmore Diekmann, Otto P. Niethammer, Al Hardins, Jr., and Irene Mooney. Also present, Lewis F. Volpe, County Auditor. Newsmen present: Chuck Leach, Bruce Thompson and Fred Sievers. Also present: John Munger, representing the Chamber of Commerce and County Attorney, Russell Lloyd.

Meeting was called to order by President and Council continued to review the budgets.

### SHERIFF

Sheriff, Jerry Riney, appeared to explain his budget...needs additional men. If he doesn't get them he can not give paid vacations. Also, needs the money to send men to Academy. They do not get paid overtime hours. Is meeting work done within the City but needs more help for the County work.

When asked if the three Circuit Court Bailiffs would be able to serve as deputies..answer was "no, because two of them are over sixty five and one soon will be."

He noted that Chief Deputy O'Risky has had to take prisoners to court himself simply because there was not enough help. The Sheriff has had to operate the radio because of not enough help...also, they have had to take two mental patients in the same car, which is very dangerous.

Mr. Harding suggested that next year the Sheriff put the three Circuit Court Bailiffs in his budget.

Mr. Schroeder, of the Chamber of Commerce, and Arkla...recommends that the addition of eight men be studied to see if they really need the new employees and to see how much employees work.

John Munger, of the Chamber of Commerce, feels that the pay should be different between City and County policement because of the lack of formal training of the County policemen. Mr. Brune asked if training was the sole difference...Sheriff replied that Mr. Munger is not acquainted with the training program that Sheriff's department has. Men take classes on their own time. Men are now required to spend so many hours in training before they go on the County payroll...on the job training with professional officers.

# PERRY TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Ben Bockstege, Perry Township Assessor, appeared to explain his budget...wants a decision as to whether he should stay at home or move to Civic Center. Mr. Brune asked about extra deputies and difference in home office and Civic Center...reply that County Assessor does some of the work now that he would have to do if he were here...which is the reason for the extra help.

### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

Robert Hayes, Prosecuting Attorney, appeared to explain his budget...asking for four new deputies and an assistant secretary. With new Superior Court system and with City Court running two nights a week is the reason fro need of extra help. Compared to other counties Venderburgh does not have as many deputies and salaries are no as high. John Munger recommends that two deputies be allowed instead of four...full time people be used instead of part time.

# BOEHNE CONVALESCENT CENTER

Henry Harness, Boehne Convalescent Center Supt., appeared to explain his budget...increases in salary comes about because of Federal minimum wage law....Mr. Munger said "our committee recommends phasing out Boehne Convalescent Center after six months of 1970, therefore, cutting budget in half...should not have two County Homes." Mr. George Woehler said the committee to study County Home and Boehne will not have the report ready until December. Mr. Kinney suggested that the State Tax Board can do the cutting in December.

### BOEHNE CONVALESCENT CENTER (CONT'D.)

Mr. Harness doubts that County Home can get license for comprehensive care because of so many people that are at Boehne are comprehensive care people. Nursing homes will not the patients from Boehne because they are not desirable and County Home is not licensed to take them. Mr. Harding believes that Chamber of Commerce should have talked with the Boehne Convalescent Center before it made a recommendation.

# UNION TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Fay C. Hille, Union Township Assessor, appeared to explain his budget...is going to turn in his resignation as Trustee of Union township.

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### COUNTY HOME

Albert Breedlove, County Home Supt., appeared to explain his budget...increase in salaries is to bring salaries up to minimum wage law. Mr. Breedlove is going to retire at the end of February. Has 30 patients at the County Home now.

### SUPT. OF COUNTY BUILDINGS

Jack Harness, Supt. of County Buildings, appeared to explain his budget...Mrs. Mooney asked about the heating plant for the Coliseum. Mr. Harness said that it is the hope of the Commissione rs that the Coliseum will be allowed to continue to operate. At the present time there is no heat there. \$25,000 is what the new heating plant will cost. Philharmonic maintains office space there and various V teran s organizations, also the recreation commission. Questioned by Mr Kinney about air conditioners and drinking fountains...Mr. Harness replied that is for the County Home and other County Buildings. Mrs. Mooney asked if air conditioners could be moved from the Court H use to County Home. Mr. Harness said that at Commissioners meeting they talked about that and are going to move the air conditioners to the County Home.

# AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Edwin Cole appeared for Herschel Whitham, Agricultural Agent, as he was ill...budget prepared by a thirteen member board.

### BUILDING COMMISSIONER

Ed Roehm, Building Commissioner, appeared to explain his budget...is using one of the Supt. of Buildings cars since he no longer has a need for it.

### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

A. J. "Ted" Stofleth appeared to explain their budget...explained that Acct. #106, per diem of Board of Review...Board of Review will be in session at least six months because of appeals.. reason for increase in postage, Acct. 201A, is due to contemplated increase in rate of postage. Acct. 201C, telephone, increased because of the number of phones that have been added since moving to new complex. Acct. 201D2, County Attorney's travel expense is new because of the traveling that they must do. Acct. 205A & B, Hillcrest-Washington Home needs roof and air conditioning moved from Annex to Hillcrest Home...asking for \$2,000 to convert boiler at Hillcrest-Washington Home to gas. Acct. 436, insurance, is for all the County employees. Mrs. Mooney wants to know what offices are covered by the Commissioner's insurance account.

Acct. 506, care of T B patients, was explained by Mrs. Hebbeler. There have been fifteen admissions to Hillcrest at Vincennes ...increase is due to surgery for patients...cost \$10.75 per day for patient care at Hillcrest...\$60.00 a day for intensive care in hospital here. Last year average stay from February to December was  $4\frac{1}{2}$  months.

Acct. 406, expense-voting machines, need \$15,000 to buy five more machines.

Acct. 404, Public Health Nursing Assn....City Council is going to try to work something out with P H N.A. Dr. Arnold Brockmole spoke on the P.H.N.A. situation...two or three weeks ago the P H.N.A. met with Health Officer and agreed to move into the new complex. Mrs. Mooney said that in January of 1965 the P.H N.A. voted not to come in.

Acct. 416, Area Plan Commission...Mr. E. Kenneth Marlin spoke in behalf of the budget..2/3 comes back for the transportation and development....only one additional person is needed.

Acct. 428, Southwestern Indiana Adult Mental Health Center...Bob Spear, Business Admn.

explained this account...patient clinic has been in business since 1964....10% of income from patient fees. Dr. Longstaff also appeared he is with the clinic on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.. also, has a private practice, is also at Deaconess.

Acct. 429, Child Guidance Center...Daryl Blackburn appeared to explain this budget.

Acct. 432, Evansville Association for R tarded Children, was explained by John Hesse, President, has increased for the trainees at McDonald Hopeland within the last six months. Salary increases start January 1.

Acct. 437, Southwestern Indiana Mental Health Center, was explained by Judge, William Miller.... must have a medical director by next year, July 1, or project will fall flat on its face...wants money aither from one of the other health budgets and put in general fund so that a director can be hired. Mr. William Bulger also spoke...first year should bring \$175,000 of Federal money.

Acct. 601B, Burdette Park Improvement, was explained by Mrs. Louise DeVoy...should be used for a drainage problem...also the front of the paivllion needs painting.

### VOTER'S REGISTRATION

Florence Lietz and Essadee Detroy appeared to explain the budget for registration.

# VETERAN'S SERVICE OFFICE

Cecil Hamman, Service Officer, explained this budget....he claims there has been a 20% work load increase, due to the WW I Veterans becoming older.

### DRAINAGE BOARD

Sam Biggerstaff, County Surveyor, appeared to explain this budget...extra money for attorneys is needed for reassessment of legal drains. Drainage Board will be meeting once a week... will be more work to do.

### THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 4, 1969

Newsmen present: Chuck Leach, Fred Sievers and Bruce Thompson. Also present: John Munger, representing the Chamber of Commerce and County Atbrneys, Russell Lloyd and Thomas Lockyear.

Meeting was called to order by President and Council continued to review the budgets.

### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Veteran's Service Officer, Cecil Hamman, returned and told that he and his secretary put in forty four hours a week during January and February this year.

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John Munger spoke for Chamber of Commerce in supporting the Purchasing Agent and secretary.... County Auditor, Lewis Volpe explained that all contracts are a year ahead of time. Contracts are being advertised now for purchases during 1970. This is why Mr. Volpe wanted this done earlier in the year. He thinks that County Attorneys should explain the legal part of it. Mr. Munger suggested that a Purchasing Agent not be hired until July of 1970.

### COUNTY AUDITOR

Lewis Volpe, County Auditor, explained his budget...some of the clerks in his office work nights in order to keep up. He explained that the Drainage Board clerk sends out all tax bills on the ditches and that he is the legal secretary for the Drainage Board. He will be willing to cut Extra Clerical Acct. #103, due to the fact that he will be getting a new machine that does more work than the old machine...could probably get by with \$1,500.

# AUDITOR, MECHANIZED ACCOUNTING

Auditor explained he needs \$20,000 for the Extra Clerical because of the reassessment. He is very concerned about getting the tax bills out on time...explained his need for a new machine is because one of the machines broke down during the tax billing last year...will now have five machines instead of six, because the new machine works much faster.

Will need ten people for four months in Extra Clerical. The larger townships are the ones that are really holding him up and not the smaller townships...any change by the Board of Review requires thirteen complete changes.

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Recessed for one hour....to go visit the jail.

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John Munger made a suggestion that no vacation clerk be hired for any of the offices...should use the new phone system instead. Mr. Brune thinks that a one clerk office should have a vacation secretary.

### COUNTY CORONER

Earl Cox, Deputy Coroner, explained this budget.

In discussing the Coroner's budget...Council thinks that they should have a non-doctor run for Coroner and pay more money to him and aliminate the Chief Deputy. John Munger is going to bring up that question at a Tax Committee meeting to see if a doctor is required to run for that job.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

In discussing the Prosecutor's budget...he needs more deputies and it is hard to get attorneys to work for such a low salary. John Munger pointed out that they are young attorneys that are in there to get some experience in oriminal law and can get it by working in the Prosecutor's office. Next year the Prosecutor plans to put a full time Prosecutor in budget for \$30,000, of which half will be paid by the State. That way a Prosecutor can have a full time office and not have to worry about private practice.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

Dale Work, Director, appeared to explain the Welfare budget...he recommended that two accounts be reduced, Old Age Assistance and Assistance to Disabled. Mr. Brune asked what is Child Welfare Service? Answer: if there is an emergency family breakup that it is to take care of the dependent children. John Munger asked what percentage of 4½ million can be cut by Council... answer: Personal Service Account #403, IJ 403Ll & 2. When asked if #405, insurance was included in County insurance Mr. Work answered....they were not invited to participate in the County insurance program at all.

Mileage for case workers is allowed at 10¢ a mile of \$40 a month. They have a foster home in Birdseye, Tell City and Mt. Vernon. Salary range is set by the State. Council can not very well recommend what the salary is going to be.

They are asking for a total of 13 new people...602A furniture, is for the new clerks...needs more space...only has room for one more clerk...does not have a place for the other new ones that he needs. Mr. Brune asked if they could use the area allowed for the P.H.N.A,...answer yes, because it is directly across the hall.

Father Meny spoke in behalf of the Local Welfare Rights...asked that the council allow all the case workers that they can because some of the people have gone before the Welfare and there just simply have not been enough case workers on hand or time enough for the ones who were there to see them. He believes that many of the people in the County are mt being served as well as they could be, for lack of help. Mr. Munger asked how much more money it would require to meet adequate needs....Father Meny replied it would probably have to be doubled.

### COUNTY HIGHWAY

Charles Althaus, Supt., explained the Highway budget...changed foreman classification to Asst. Supt...wants to add a new man as foreman. County has purchased a new Gradall. Every time that thy have trained a man to work the Gradall he leaves for industry and gets \$5.08 an hour... compared to \$2.48 being paid by County...new rate \$3.00 per hour...he is trying to give raises so that he can keep help, rather than lose them to industry.

### EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH AIRPORT AUTHORITY DISTRICT

Howard Trockman, Attorney, John Bennett, and Robert Leich appeared to explain the Airport budget. Mr. Bennett told of the need for a fire truck....should cost \$40,000....has radio equipment, will go through fences or over rough terrain...it will take a heavy vehicle for 500 gallons of foam....can get about 2500 gallon capacity by pouring foam into tanks at the back of the truck.

### EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH LEVEE AUTHORITY DISTRICT

Roy Shrote, Supt., appeared to explain this budget...eight operators are in the 1970 budget....there were eleven in 1969,...using central garage now the reason for fewer employees.

### Meeting recessed: 5:10 p.m.

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FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 1969

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The Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, met this 5th day of

September, 1969 at \$:00 a.m., with the following members present: William J. Brune, President,

Paul Kinney, Robert Lutz, Gilmore Diekmann, Otto P. Niethammer, Al Harding, Jr., and Irene

Mooney. Also present, Lewis F. Volpe, County Auditor. Newsmen present: Chuck Leach, Fred Sievers,

Ron Lyles and Bruce Thompson. Others in attendance: John Munger, representing the Chamber of Commerce and County Attorneys, Russell Lloyd and Thomas Lockyear.

The meeting was called to order by President and Council continued to review the budgets.

### CITY-COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Dr. Arnold Brockmole explained the budget....County pays 14.6 for people outside the City. Insurance is not hospital insurance....it is on the building and equipment.....he said that the quarters are sufficient now but if they get everything that they are trying to get that they will not have enough room. They have not moved here yet because they were waiting for P.H.N.A. If Health Dept., has to take over P.H.N.A. they will only take over the part that is taken care of by the tax payers....part of P.H.N.A is taken care of by United Fund.

### PIGEON TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Maynard Rogers, Pigeon Twp. Assessor, explained his budget....real estate draftsman is to make the plat books instead of having them sent out. It cost \$4,500 last year to have new plat books printed. He feels that a part time real estate draftsman can bring books up in shape for less money. Mr. Harding asking about processing forms 101 and if he could cut one of his deputies .....answer that he would think that he could.....He thinks that perhaps a part time college boy or a Laine Drafting boy could do the work on the plat books.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

County Auditor, Lewis Volpe, asked the Council to reconsider his budget taking \$400 of the extra clerical and giving four in the bookkeeping department more money. Mr. Harding moved that they reconsider and bive the claims clerk and two bookkeepers an extra \$100 but not the supervisor. Motion died for lack of a second. Mrs. Mooney moved that they allow the accounts as the auditor presented. Mr. Harding seconded motion. Motion failed.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Superior Court, Acct. 110, will work all day two days a week. Courts get  $10\phi$  a mile or \$30 per month for mileage.

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Juvenile Acct. 401 is chronic truants. They are exposed to  $\frac{1}{2}$  day classes, which is about as long as they can sit still.

Acct. 602, equipment, is for hearing room for the children to make the room more formal... for recording equipment.

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Mr. Paul Torian appeared to explain the insurance (that is Paul Torian Agency and Hahn & Becker Agency). Their company handles the liability insurance in the commissioner's budget \$46,000 for the County Highway....when asked if he had the hospitalization insurance he said he is not involved in that at all. Mr. Lutz questioned if the hospital insurance rates could be raised next year....was told that it is a one year contract.

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Sheriff, Jerry Riney, appeared to explain why he had the hospitalization in his budget. The department is under a merit system and they voted on a different policy than the County's because:

- - 2. County plan does not have maternity benefits. Sheriff's plan does....plus \$115 for the doctor.
  - 3. Sheriff's insurance is family plan or which ever plan the person wants.

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Since this has been deleted from his budget he would like for Council to reconsider and put it back into the budget. The men themselves are paying the premium now.

Acct. 106, Board of Review, salaries can be set by County Council. They are now getting \$20 and \$12 per day...\$25 per day for field men. It was noted that Welfare Department needs the space the P.H.N.A. has been reluctant to move in to...but it was brought up by John Munger

that the Health Department might need the space as they will be having some form of nursing service.

### AREA PLAN COMMISSION & TRANSPORTATION & DEVELOPMENT

Transportating and Development will be reduced by 2/3 from the Federal Government. County's share would be approximately \$40,000.

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Mr. Howard Alexander, President of the Board, of Southwestern Indiana Adult Mental Health.. all but the last three positions that are requested on the budget are filled. Bob Spear spoke also. Mr. Alexander said they are reimbursed by the State and have to keep their points up or they will not get the money from the State...should get \$116,000 from the State this year. Mr. Brune asked who establishes the wages...answer...the Board of Directors. Staffing grant should be ready to be reviewed by December of this year. They have a \$1000 that can be used to get this staffing grant ready. He feels that there is no jeopardy of them losing any Federal money becaus of not getting the other funds.

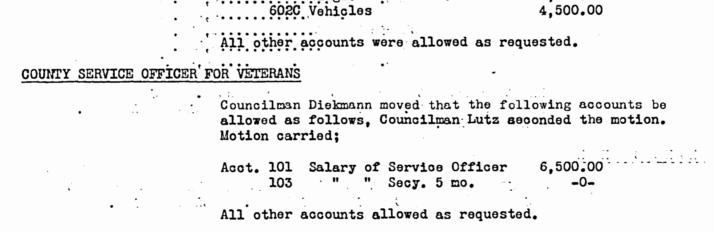

Provided, however, That disbursements from each appropriation are further limited to the amounts listed for the detail accounts making up such appropriation unless said detail accounts are increased or decreased by another ordinance or resolution of the county council. (If one or more of the detail accounts within an appropriation for an office or department are increased by not more than the total amount that one or more other detail accounts within the same appropriation are concurrently decreased by ordinance or resolution of the county council, neither advertising to the taxpayers nor approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners is required. Other changes affecting more than one appropriation for a department or office or appropriation changes affecting more than one department or office within a fund require advertising, additional appropriation ordinance and approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners.)

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Section 2. That for the said fiscal year there is hereby appropriated out of the County General Fund the following:

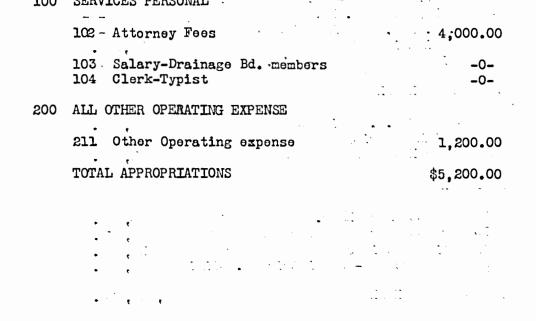

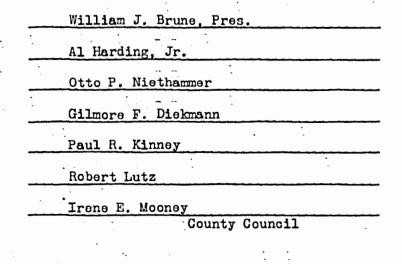

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### ORDINANCE FOR TAX LEVIES

An Ordinance Levying Taxes and fixing the Rate of Taxation for the purpose of raising revenue to meet the necessary expense of the County Government and its Institutions for the calendar year 1970.

Be it Ordained by the Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, That: Section 1. For the use and benefit of the County General Fund, there shall be levied and assessed, in the year 1969 collectible in the year 1970, the sun of one dollar fiftyfive cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, and no Dollars on each Taxable Poll in said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the County General Fund in the County Treasury.

For the use and benefit of the County Bond & Sinking Fund, there shall be levied and assessed, in the year 1969, collectible in the year 1970, the sum of fifteen cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the County Bond or Sinking Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 3. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport District Fund, there shall be levied and assessed, in the year 1969, collectible in the year 1970, the sum of 4.5 cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 3A. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Cumulative Buiking Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1969, collectible in the year 1970, the sum of 4 cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of taxable property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Airport Authority District Cumulative Building Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 4. For the use and benefit of the Evansville-Vanderburgh Levee Authority District Fund, there shall be levied and assessed, in the year 1969, collectible in the year 1970, the sum of eight cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the Evansville-Vanderburgh Levee Authority District Fund in the County Treasury.

Section 5A. For the use and benefit of the Poor Relief Bond Fund, there shall be levied and assessed in the year 1969, collectibel in the year 1970, the sum of various cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of taxable property of the respective Townships of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid .

Section 6. For the use and benefit of the County Welfare Fund there shall be levied in and assessed,/the year 1969, the sum of sixty-two cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the County Welfare Fund in the County Treasury.

Chairman Taylor advised members of the Board it was the duty of this Board to review

budgets and cut them, if possible, but this Board has not authority to raise budgets. The

Board represents the taxpayers and is non-partisan.

It was decided to ask for copies of the Building Authority's budget for the year of 1970. John Munger of the Chamber of Commerce stated the Chamber of Commerce feels this Board should look at the Building Authority budget and ask questions to see that work is

being done efficiently and economically...and that the Chamber will support the Board in

this action.

Mr. Munger also pointed out that the major premise of the Chamber of Commerce was that no new personnel should be approved in either the City, County or School budgets and that pay raises be limited to 5% with the possibility of cutting back each salary account in an effort to cause a 40 hour work week. This, he recommended, could be accomplished over a two year period.

Mr. Woehler said he believed the County and City personnel should be paid salaries commensurate with industry...but should also have the same working conditions. He, therefore, suggested that on January 1st, 1970, hours be from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and in 1971 from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

Mr. Harding suggested each office holder be asked to appear and the policy be explained to him.

Mr Nicholson suggested you couldn't buch the national trend which he felt was toward a shorter work week.

Lewis F. Volpe, Auditor, then laid before the Board, budgets, tax levies and tax rates for the ensuing year, as certified by the proper officers or bodies of the following corporations:

Chairman Taylor thanked Mayor McDonald for his time and explanation.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion that Account A-11, Salaries and Wages, Regular-be reduced from \$43,983. to \$29,039...a reduction of \$14,944.

# Tuesday, Sept. 9, 1969

Meeting called to order at 8:30 a.m. by Chairman Taylor. All members present except Mr. Davidson, who arrived later.

Mr. Nicholson asked the question ... why income or fees are not shown in budgets.

Mr. Taylor introduced Mr. Russell E. Bailey of Chamber of Commerce Tax Committee who has made a study of the Police and Fire Department budget requests. There were eight men on this committee.

Mr. Bailey said he had made a study of all city budgets including Police and Fire. . Departments and that some increases were inflationary and should be kept to 4 or 5%. He suggested a guide line in all departments should be 5% and no new men should be allowed at . this time until a study is made to determine just how many men are needed.

Mr. Munger suggested patrolmen be allowed \$7300 and recommended an 8% differential in ranks.l.he recommended no change in salary of Chief of Police...at suggested \$14,000.

At this time City Attorney Matthews appeared before the Board and asked to speak regarding the elimination of the administrative assistant for the Mayor. He pointed out the need for such a person..and asked the Board to review this position and reconsider their previous decision. Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Matthews. No action.

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### POLICE DEPARTMENT

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Mayor McDonald appeared before the Board to defend the Police Department budget. He explained he was trying to make the Police Department more attractive to young men and to have a department made up of professional, well qualified policemen. He pointed out also that that the difference of pay between the various ranks, at the present time, was too low...no incentive for men to take promotions which include more responsibility. He also explained the longevity scale was set by law. .Mr. Munger said a report of the Evansville Bar Association shows salaries paid to lower ranking officers are not out of line but the differential between the ranks should be raised.

Mayor McDonald said police officials are on trial all over the nation and during the recent trouble in our city he could point with pride to the Police Department of Evansville. He said that Evansville ranks fourth in population of cities in Indiana and eighth in pay rates paid police personnel.

Mr. Woehler made a motion that:

Patrolmen's pay be set at \$7300. a reduction of \$82,164.22 with a differential of 6% increase from patrolmen's rank up through rank of assistant chief, subject to check by controller's office.

Mr. Wittgen seconded motion.

Before taking vote, Mayor McDonald said this was a mistake that problems today are multiplied many times...he asked please do not cut police department so Evansville cannot have a first class police department. He asked that his salary be cut instead...and said "Let's give this city the opportunity to have a first class department properly compensated...the public is willing to pay for this kind of a police department. He also suggested a differential of 5% between ranks instead of 6%...

At this time, motion made by Mr. Woehler was voted on. There were four "aye" votes. Mr. Davidson and Mr. Harding voted "nay". Motion carried.

No further change in budget.

# Mayor McDonald suggested reducing part-time secretary from \$4200 to \$3200... reduction of \$100. Approved.

Mr. Woehler seconded motion. When put to a vote, there were four "aye" votes with Mr. Davidson and Mr. Harding voting "nay". Motion carried.

Mr. Carl Tindle representing Fire Department appeared to explain the new fire alarm system. Mr. Tindle explained under state law fire boxes have to be tested every thirty days..there will be 160 boxes plus about 60 auxiliary boxes in schools, etc. He also explained all old alarm boxes, cables, etc. would have to be removed. Mr. Woehler noted it would be well to check the new system during 1970 and, based on information from city officials, after 1970 it will be possible to delete the services of two men.

Wednesday, Sept. 10, 1969

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Meeting called to order at 8:20 a.m. by Chairman Taylor, all members present, except Mr. Davidson, who arrived later.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. GEORGE WOEHLER

Mr. Woehler stated he thought the City, County and School personnel should be on a 40 hour work week comparable to industry because these employees expect the same rate of pay and benefits. The City employees, he said, have reached the level of industry... they have life insurance and hospitalization. Schools have part hospitalization and life insurance but in the county there should probably be some adjustments made as to these benefits. This body cannot compel anyone to go on a 40 hour work week, but he suggested sometime during this meeting the Mayor; President Helfrich of the City Council, Mr. Stofleth, President of the County Commissioners and Mr. Ehrdman of Evansville-Vanderburgh school system be asked to cooperate in this suggestion of going on a 40 hour work week. Mr. Woehler said it must be a cooperative effort of all phases of government. He suggested this Board adopt a resoltuion to this effect and this resolution be brought to the attention of the Chamber of Commerce, Evansville Future and other Civic groups.

Mr. Hubbard noted this Board can recommend but cannot demand.

Mr. Harding said this action should be done in one step...that he understood the County Council is receptive to allowing hospitalization for the county after January 1st next year. Since they have already taken action on this....it will have to be done as an additional appropriation next year.

#### REVIEW OF COUNTY BUDGETS

#### COUNTY AUDITOR

Mr. Volpe appeared to answer questions regarding his budget requests. Budget approved as requested.

#### COMMENTS BY MR. MUNGER

Mr. Munger suggested if a resolution was adopted by this Board it might be well to include the urging of setting up a central purchasing unti of some kind.

Chief Deputy Florence Bruck appeared before the Board to answer questions regarding this budget. Budget approved as presented.

REMARKS BY MR. DRAVENS

Mr. Cravens, purchasing agent for City of Evansville was asked to explain his duties to the Board and to answer questions regarding the possibility of creating a central purchasing agency.

Mr. Cravens pointed out the three basic requirements in purchasing was quality, price and service. He explained the system used by the City as far as requisitions, etc. are used.

Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Craven for a most enlightening interview.

Mr. Davidson suggested if this central purchasing agency is established...it might be well to ask the Purchasing Association for help in setting up such an organization.

County commissioner President, A. J. "Ted" Stofleth addressed the Board and said the Commissioners were heartily in favor of having a county purchasing agent...but the County Council had denied their request for funds to be used for this purpose. He said that Mr. Buth was having a study made regarding this and that a report will be made on or about the 1st of October.

Commissioner Buthod endorsed Mr. Stofleth's statements and said that the 1965 statutes permits a purchasing agency for county purchasing. He told the Board he had a very outstanding committee working on this problem. At this time, the Commissioners do not have definite plans...but Mr. Buthod said he felt a contract with the city, schools, etc. could be worked out to assure a non-partisan agency.

Mr. Hewitt, County Commissioner, also favors a purchasing agreement of some kind.

When asked about their feelings on the "40 hour week"...all Commissioners are agreeable.

Mr. Buthod again stated, as he has many times in the past, that he was also in favor of a "job study" and job classifications being established.

Meeting recessed at 12 o'clock poon.

Meeting opened by Chairman Taylor at 1:30 p.m. All members present. Reviewing of budgets continued.

He explained in detail why it is impossible to run a court without bailiffs. He also explained that each judge in this new system ran his own court and each judge needed his own staff and it would not be possible to have a "pool" to draw from. Judge Buente noted this was probably done by the Board at the suggestion of Mr. Munger. Mr. Hubbard informed the Judge that Mr. Munger had no vote on this Board and the action was taken after much discussion and that the members of the Board were responsible.. not Mr. Munger.

Mr. Taylor thanked Judge Buente for coming back to explain the duties of the bailiffs more fully.

Mr. Munger thanked members of the Board for defending his position.

No further action.

Mayor McDonald asked for permission to speak on this subject..he pointed out the amount requested would only purchase a used truck of this sort ... that a new truck like this would probably cost aighty five or ninety thousand dollars. He suggested that it might be possible to take one of the city's second line pumpers and convert it into a foam truck for the airport. He said it could be converted by the machine shop personnel of the Fire Department. Mayor McDonald explained this equipment was needed very badly at the airport. When asked what the cost would be he estimated the conversion and construction as well as a "lease" or "use" a agreement with the city could be done for approximately \$15,000. EVANSVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY & VANDERBURGH COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY

Mr. Edward A. Howard, Director of Evansville Public Library and Vanderburgh County Public . Library, and members of his staff appeared to answer questions regarding budget requests.

Mr. Howard answered questions with regard to number of employees, classifications, rate of pay, etc.

Attorney Keck spoke regarding increase of salary for Mr. Howard...pointing out that the library board is in favor of granting the \$1000.00 increase in salary.

After discussion, Mr. Wittgen made the following motion:

Account #12-Salaries of Asst..be reduced from \$433,806 to \$428,806... reduction of \$5000.

department had had placed on it since moving to the Civic Center and having the sole responsibility of jail. He also stated the new courts system have put an extra work load on his men.

After much discussion, Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Riney and his officers for their time and courtesy.

Mr. John Munger asked for time to express the recommendation of the Tax Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. First of all the committee opposes the eight new men asked for by Sheriff Riney. He also recommended the following salary scale: Salary of Chief Co. Policeman... be \$9000. Salary of Lts. (2) be \$8000. Salary of Sgts. (8) be \$7500. Salary of Patrolmen (34) be \$7100. Salary of Probation Patrolmen...\$6000. Salary of Matrons...\$5000. After discussion, Mr. Woehler made the following motion:

Account 102A-Salary of Chief Co. Policeman (1) be reduced from \$9200 to \$9000. Account 102B-Salary of Lts. (2) be reduced from \$16,400 to \$16,000. Eccount 102C-Salary of Sgts. (8) be reduced from \$62,400 to \$60,800. Account 102D-Salary of Patrolmen (34) be reduced from \$251,600 to \$244,800.

Total reduction....\$9000.

Mr. Harding spoke out against the reasoning of these cuts and asked that the rest of the budget be considered before voting on the above motion.

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Vote was taken on motion, with Mr. Harding and Mr. Davidson voting "nay". Motion carried.

Recessed at 12:00 o'clock noon.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 1:30 p.m. All members present.

#### EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH SCHOOL CORPORATION DISCUSSION

Mr. Ehrdman, Mr. Riggs and Mr. Roberts of the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation appeared before the Board to answer questions regarding budget requests:

Viewing of budget began, with questions being asked by members of the Board. Mr. Harding asked regarding additional employees in this years budget...why there were so many more. Mr. Ehrdman explained the school system was trying to improve the ratio of school pupils per professional employee. He also maid the number of teachers needed was always an estimated guess..no one could tell for sure just how many teachers would be needed or what the school enrollment would be. He said the enrollment this year was down some from last year...at the present time...but it could increase at any time...that this was somehing no one could foretell.

. . .

Many more questions were asked including new high school being built to replace Central High School.

Mr. Harding pointed out there was really not much that this Board could do regarding the number of employees...because contracts had already been signed and these people were already hired. This procedure of signing contracts and hiring teachers before the budget is approved, is, in Mr. Harding's opinion, wrong.

Mr. Taylor asked Mr. Erdman if he could suggest any item in this budget that could be cut. Mr. Ehrdman pointed out that the contracts with the teachers had already been signed and must be honored.

Mr. Woehler noted that the contracts do not show in the entire picture--fringe benefits are not included in the package deal. Benefits such as paid insurance, hospitalization, pensions, etc. are not considered when new contracts are signed and raises given...this year's raises to teaachers amdunted to approximately a 9% increase, which is much higher than other employees were given. Mr. Woehler asked if, in the future, they evaluate what percent of increase in onctracts entered into with teachers really amounts to including all fringe benefits.

Mr. Taylor thanked these gentlemen for their courtesy and time and for their very well prepared budget.

No action taken until Monday.

#### COMMENTS BY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR

Chairman Taylor said this Board had taken an oath to do a job to the best of their ability and to defend the constitution of the United States...but he was disturbed by the interruptions and pressures, phone calls, etc. He asked for the full cooperation of the members of this Baord to continue with the work at hand. Mr. Wœhler; Mr. Harding and Mr. Hubbard all said they had no regrets. Mr. Taylor pointed out that everyone has a right to their convictions and to yote the way they want to do ...and he wanted everyone on this Board to do that.

## REVIEW OF SHERIFF'S BUDGET ... CONTINUED

Mr. Harding reported he had talked with Sheriff Riney, as he was asked to do...and the Sheriff was agreeable to cutting patrolmen to \$7200., but he asked that the Board reconsider the other cuts...that in each of these classifications there is a difference of at least \$450.00

between his men and the police department.

Mr. Munger said he had talked with the Chairman of the Tax Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and had been asked to stand firm on recommendation to hold pay scale as recommended by Chamber of Commerce, and also to ask eight new men not be approved., since it is their opinion the eight new men are not needed.

Mr. Wittgen noted that after hearing the explanation of Mr. Riney and hearing the Crime Commission report he thinks the new deputies are needed. This, he noted, is his own personal opinion.

Mr. Woehler made a motion that his former motion be amended to read:

After considerable discussion Mr. Woehler made the following motion:

Recessed at 12:00 o'clock noon.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 1:40 p.m. All members present.

#### REVIEW OF EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH SCHOOL CORPORATION BUDGET CONTINUED:

Mr. Nicholson suggested a blanket cut in the budget in the amount of \$200,000.00 rather than go through each item in the budget..premitting Mr. Ehrdman and Mr. Riggsoto work it out.

Mr. Ehrdman and Mr. Riggs returned to the meeting to get an opinion on suggestion. Mr. Harding asked Mr. Erdman if his Board recognized the fact that it is subject to some citizen control...and if it doesn't he wondered why this Tax Adjustment Board reviews the budget of the School Corporation at all.

Mr. Ehrdman again pointed out that most of the school budget requests are contractural requests and cannot be changed.

After much conversation, Mr. Woehler made a motion the budget be reduced from \$23,018,469 to \$22,743,469...a reduction of \$275,000.

When put to a vote, motion carried, with Mr. Nicholson voting "nay".

Mr. Woehler pointed out, as a point of interest, that the increase allowed in this budget over last year, as reduced, was still up approximately  $27\frac{1}{2}$ .

Chairman Taylor again thanked Mr. Ehrdman and Mr. Riggs.

#### BUILDING AUTHORITY

Mr. Munger, representing the Tax Committee of the Chamber of Commerce asked the Board to consider the Chamber of Commerce recommendation of no new employees and a 5% limitation on salary increases. Mr. Dale Andrews appeared to answer questions regarding his budget.

He noted the system of cleaning and operation of buildings was recommended by a professional firm from Atlanta Georgia...although pay scales were less than recommended.

Mayor McDonald asked for time to speak on behalf of the Building Authority and the excellent job he thought was being done on keeping this building clean. Mayor McDonald said he thought the Building Authority was to be commended on the fine job being done by its maintenance crew and housekeeping staff...that as he had observed it, it was a fine operation.

Mr. Andrews also said this was a minicipal corporation different than city, county, and school corporations and special legislation applies to the Building Authority...but their first responsibility is to the bond holders. In defending his budget requests, Mr. Andrews pointed out the leases, prepared by attorneys, sets out the specific operation of this complex and in no way should be compared with the way the Courthouse and the City Hall were operated.

Mr. Harding made a motion this budget be accepted as presented. Mr. Wittgen seconded the motion.

When put to a vote, there were two "ayes" (Mr. Wittgen and Mr. Harding) and two "nays" (Mr. Woehler and Mr. Hubbard). Mr. Nicholson abstained from voting and Mr. Davidson was not present. Another vote was taken and Mr. Nicholson vote "Aye". Motion carried. Chairman Taylor then suggested the vote be made unanimous.

Meeting recessed at 5:30 p.m. until 9:00 o'clock Tuesday, September 16, 1969.

#### AUDITORIUM

Mr. Dressback asked to speak to the Board regarding their suggestions about parking lot.

He reported he had talked with the Traffic technician, William Judd, who told him no entrance could be cut in parking lot on Walnut Street to accomodate large trucks or vans and also that the installation of "arms" would be impractical because of traffic jams.

Mr. Dressback said Mr. Judd would substaniate this in writing to him sometime this week... but is is his opinion that this system would not work.

No further action.

#### Tuesday, September 16, 1969

Meeting opened at 9:15 a.m. with Chairman Taylor, presiding. All members present. Chairman Taylor made the following statement:

"Monday, a week, ago, this 1969nTax Adjustment Board began its session to examine the 1970 budgets of the various governmental bodies totalling approximately \$49,275,600.00 which it faithfully and impartially examined and completed its review yesterday, September 15, 1969.

This vast sum of money, must be raised by taxes, which is becoming excessive, and beyond the financial ability of our local taxpayers to pay.

This board in a very harmonious way and with intelligent accounting practices applies sound business principal in its reduction of various budgets endeavoring to establish better efficiency in governmental spending. Naturally in such a program, you never please the power of the politician, however, I\*m quite sure we do have the endorsement of the general public at large.

During the past few days we have hearf of dissatisfaction in our budget review, through the news media, radio, television and public speeches, that we cut the heart out of the policemen and firemen budgets and that \$200. in starting salary prevented our fair city from having a first class police and fire department. Truthfully it was news to me to find at the present time, and for the past 7 or 8 years that we had a.second class police and fire department, also that this Tax Adjustment Board was incompetent and did not know what it was doing. It's easy to criticize, however, I\*m quite sure

pressure groups will not change the thinking of this Board.

Personally, I want to go on record to say to the members of thsi Board, I appreciate . your help and talent and your seasoned business judgement in this huge task and as far as incompetence, I would rather have the general public sit in judgement of our reputation."

#### MAYOR McDONALD

Mayor McDonald was the first to speak...and he said he was not representing the power of a politician and not representing a second class police and fire departments...although there was room for improvement in both departments. He was appearing to present wage scales which are prevelant in industry for comparison. Mayor McDonald said police and firemen are underpaid. He pointed out that \$7500 base pay with 8% differential between ranks would bring wage scale to a minimum average. Changes in the taxation structure in the State of Indiana...should be changed...the present system is outmoded. This, is the big problem today. The Common Councilof the City of Evansville agreed upon \$7500 base pay with 8% differential between ranks, unanimously. The only way these departments can be upgraded is by paying a living wage to these men and the Mayor said he was convinced the taxpayers are willing to pay for adequate police and fire protection. This is not an exorbitant request but it is a just request. As far as pension.plan, this is a state law and cannot be changed except by legislation.

#### MR. BAILEY MERRILL

Mr. Merrill appeared as Chairman of the Citizens Crime Committee and said he brought Chief Lane, Ed Smith of Police Merit Commission, members of the Bar Association, Crime Study commission and members of the City Council. He pointed out the recommendations of the Bar Association report that a full time Prosecutor was needed and the police department be upgraded. He urged very strongly that the 8% differential between ranks be approved. He said too, that the morale of the police department was severely hurt when the Tax Adjustment Board did not approve the recommendation of the Mayor and the Council. Evansville, he said, must have a first class police department and Evansville cannot wait to conquer crime...

#### ATTORNEY EDWARD SMITH VICE PRESIDENT, MERIT COMMISSION

Mr. Smith said not only from a monetary standpoint...but also principle is involved in the matter. He said the public is very much behind the police department.

#### MR. JOSEPH THEBY, SECRETARY OF POLICE MERIT COMMISSION

Mr. Theby called attention to the fact that all new officers come on the department under civil service. He said, as a businessman, he felt the 8% differential between ranks is very important...to make more incentive to try for promotions. In order to get young men of high caliber..these positions must be worth while.

#### POLICE CHIEF MAMES LANE

Chief Lane also noted the low morale of the personnel of the police department...he said he had worked extra jobs before becoming Chief and most policemen had to do this to provide for their families.

#### OTHERS

Mr. Hugo Songer and Mr. Jack Pride also spoke briefly in favor of police and fire department's raises.

Mr. Johnson of the N.A.A.C.P. said he thinks the police are doing a good jog and dmands for higher salaries should be met.

Mr. Roy Tyler, recent law graduate and instructor at Universidy of Evansville would have the Board take into consideration the young men going to college in order to qualify for better ranks...cannot work extra or "moonlight" and go to college. In order to get high type men for future officers ... wages must be raised.

Mr. F. Froelich, Council of Churches, said a study of eight months had been completed by his group and in may ways his report and the report of the Bar Association were comparable. He also urged the importance of 8% differential between ranks.

Mr. James Helfrich, City Council President, reported the Council had voted unanimously on proposal and urged Tax Board to reconsider.

Mr. Ted Lockyear, Attorney, spoke in favor of proposed salary increases.

Mr. John Caldwell, a member of the City Council said he was speaking as a "negro" and he was interested in trying to recruit more young negro men as police officers. He said this was important to the welfare of the community and he felt adquate salaries must be paid to attract young men to this profession.

Mr. Paul Kinney, spoke as a private citizen and representative of Washington Square shopping Center...he praised the fire and police departments and said this is not the time to lower morale but to raise it. He also asked the Board to reconsider their decision.

#### COMMENTS BY OTHERS--CONT'D

Mr. Jim Swonder, City Councilman, spoke in favor of what he said is a first class police department and in order to maintain a first class police department..this raise is absolutely necessary.

#### MAYOR McDONALD

Mayor McDonald asked for time to say something on behalf of the fire department ... he said firemen work sixty three hours a week and some departments in Indiana by legislative act have been reduced to fifty six hours a week. If this happens here...it will cost the City of Evansville \$250,000. He siad the fire department was one of the finest in the State and should be compensated for their service.

#### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. Munger introduced two members of the chamber of commerce, Mr. Al Thompson, Chairman of Tax Committee and Mr. Russell Bailey of the City Budget sub-committee.

Mr. Thompson said the Evansville Chamber of Commerce took a position strongly recommending all increases not exceed 5%...this is strictly a matter of economics. He said they were not picking on the police and fire departments but had to look for economy in all budgets. Because of requested high budgets...tax rate would have an adverse effect on attracting new industry to this community. He said the Chamber had recommended all city, county and . school employees be put on a 40 hour work week and that wage increases be limited to 4% or 5%

#### TAX BOARD MEMBERS

Mr. Taylor and Mr. Woehler said they were not "anti" police or fire or sheriff -- but must consider people on Social Security and on fixed incomes. They are doing this job as a service to the community and Mr. Woehler said he was just as dedicated as anyone who had talked today. Mr. Wittgen spoke briefly on the proposed wage scale and pointed out the raises proposed would range from 7% to 23%. Mr. Harding said he did not intend to make any comments...but maybe the differential in ranks was warranted...but he thought the big "hang up" is the pension plan of these two departments. He would ask that everyone cooperate to see that the pension plans are revised and if this can be done .. he would be in favor of raises proposed.

#### MAYOR McDONALD

Mayor McDonald said, in view of the sincere dedication of the Board ... and he is sure the Board is acting in good faith, and in view of what has been said, he would ask that the Board give some consideration to the proposal of maintaining the 6% differential between ranks and allowing \$7500 base pay.

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Mr. Harding said he would make this motion if he could get assurance that the interested people appearing here today would try to get pension plans revised...he said he realized what is in effect now cannot be changed and that a "grand father" clause must be put in but for new employees this plan must be changed. He said "Let's get on with the job to be done, but.let's do it properly." If the pension plans are revised the money needed for pay raises would be saved many times over. Mr. Harding then suggested a recess until 9:00 o'clock tomorrow morning. Mr. Davidson seconded motion. Motion was never voted on.

More discussion. Mayor McDonald said he had been informed by the Chiefs of both departments that a reorganization plan in both departments is anticipated and if this Board will reconsider and approve the \$7500 base pay and 8% differential in ranks...the salary account of each budget can be reduced by \$20,000....total reduction in both departments...\$40,000. This, he said, will make a lot of work and reorganization but police and firemen will get their well deserved raise.

Mr. Vanover of the F.O.P. said he would call a Board meeting this afternoon to consider the proposal of revising or seeing what could be done about revising the pension plan of Evansville Police Department.

Mr. Harding made a motion meeting he recessed until 3:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Davidson seconded motion. Motion carried.

Meeting recessed at 11:35 a.m.

Wednesday, Sept. 17, 1969

Meeting was opened at 3:15 p.m. by Chairman Taylor. All members present.

Mr. Taylor read the resolution that was adopted last year by the Tax Adjustment Board.

He said copies of this resolution were sent to various organizations and the only response received by this Board was from the Chamber of Commerce.

#### PENSION PLAN

Mr. Bailey Merrill reported on assignment to get legal opinions on the possibility of reviewing pension plans of the fire and police departments. He reported it is possible to enact legislation under the classification system that will apply to a particular locality. It could be legally done but whether it could be done over objections of these organizations is the question.

Mr. Merrill said it is legally possible and practically possible. With the support of the community and the two departments involved it can be done:

Mr. Merrill said he had the personal committment of the Mayor of Evansville to support such an effort but the Mayor will not guarantee it will go through the legislature...but he gives his personal pledge to support such action. The Bar association and the Crime Commission will lend their support and he feels sure the Chamber of Commerce would endorse such effort. This, he said, is an opportunity to open the door to working out something that should have been done a long time.ago. Mr. Merrill said in asking for these pay raises we are dealing in pennies but we can save dollars by revising the pension plans.

Mr. Merrill thanked the Chairman of this Board for this extra meeting.

Mr. Woehler said he would like to make a motion with respect to adjustment and speaking only for himself and before submitting figures...would like to say that for years various interested persons have tried to get some discussion and action regarding pension plan... but have been unsuccessful. It is, therefore, gratifying to have the support now being given. This, he said, is going to be a long road. If a revision is obtained, it will not go through until sometime in 1971. Mr. Woehler thanked Mr. Harding for bringing this problem out in the open. He again emphasized that he supported the "grandfather" clause be in the plan...that men who were now on the payrolls of these departments should be paid on the basis on which they were employed. Mr. Woehler then brought to the attention of everyone...the cost of supporting these two pension plans and suggested the base pay for the police and firemen be allowed at \$7400 and the differential in rank increased to  $6\frac{1}{2}$ . He pointed out the \$50.00 increase in clothing allowance and the insurance plan. The increase in pay would range from 5.7% for patrolmen to 15.1% for assistant chiefs in the two departments.

Mr. Woehler then suggested that \$20,000 be cut from each salary account...as was offered by the Mayor at yesterday's meeting.

#### CONTROVERSY--CONTINUED

Mr. Merrill said the offer of the Police and Fire departments to do an heretofor unprecendented thing was based on the assumption that the requested \$7500 base pay and 8% differential would be granted. Mr. Merrill said Mr. Woehler's suggestion forfeits for this community a great opportunity to revise pension plans.

Mr. Harding asked for permission to speak and said he was disappointed at the Chamber of Commerce decision not to support the total program. He was amazed to think that anyone could think the pension plans can be revised without the requested salaries being approved. He said the Chamber of Commerce has declined to come even half way. He said as the situation now stands he would like to make a motion the Board reconsider their decision and put back all cuts from the Police and Fire Departments and approve these budgets as presented by the Board of Finance.

Mr. Davidson seconded motion.

Mr. Hubbard said usually there is a compromise...the fact that certain persons have agreed to support a revision of the pension plans does not mean it will be done. He cannot stand tax increases year after year. We must give some thought to people on fixed incomes.

Mr. Harding's motion put to a vote. Mr. Harding, Mr. Davidson voted "aye". Mr. Woehler, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Wittgen, Mr. Hubbard and Mr. Nicholson voted "nay". Motion failed.

Mr. Woehler then again made his motion to reconsider the police and fire department budgets

and recind the original cut and allow amount of \$7400 for base pay with  $6\frac{1}{2}$  differential between ranks, less the amount of \$20,000.00 to be cut from salary accounts of each department. Chief's salary of each department to be set at \$13,000. These figures are subject to computation of controller's office.

Mr. Hubbard seconded the motion. Motion carried. Mr. Davidson and Mr. Harding abstaining.

Restoration in police Department.....\$31,290.00 Less..... 20,000.00

Restoration in fire department...... 35,229.00 Less...... 20,000.00

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Mr. Thompson of Chamber of Commerce said the Chamber of Commerce appreciates the position of this Board and commends them for their position. He pledged support in any way possible in revising pension plans.

Mr. Harding noted he thought the Chamber of Commerce is at odds with itself, that all week, they have been advocating a 5% or less pay raise and now they are endorsing pay raises that are considerably higher.

Mr. Davidson asked everyone to support the correction of the big problem of pensions plans . as they now operate. He said this must be corrected as soon as possible.

Representatives of the Evansville Fire Fighters Local, No. 357 and of the Fraternal Order of Police asked that support indicated in their letters that are a part of these minutes... be withdrawn.

Mr. Helfrich, City Council President, called attention to the fact that all of this arguing has been about approximately  $3\phi$  on the tax rates.

#### VANDERBURGH COUNTY SHERIFF

Mr. Riney, Sheriff of Vanderburgh Couty, asked the Board now reconsider his budget since they had restored some of the cuts in the Police and Fire Department budgets.

Mr. Harding made a motion that:

Sheriff Riney's budget be restored to original request as allowed by the County Council.

Amount of restoration.....\$9000.00

Total budget approved.....\$413,600 (Salary Acct.)

Mr. Woehler seconded motion. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

September 26, 1969

Meeting called to order by Chairman Charles E. Taylor, Sr., with all members present.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion that tax rates that are a part of the minutes be approved. Mr. Woehler seconded the motion. When put to a vote motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Taylor suggested that copies of resolution adopted by this Board be sent to various governmental agencies and civic groups.

Mr. Davidson made a motion that Board reconvene again no later than December 10, 1969. Mr. Wittgen seconded the motion. Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Chairman Taylor advised the members of the Board that he thinks the cuts made should be sustained and that when the State Tax Board meets to review tax rates he will attend said meeting. Several other members, also, indicated they would be there.

Meeting adjourned at 3:10 p.m. until called meeting.

WHEREAS, under and pursuant to Chapter 119 of the Acts of 1937, it is the duty of the County Board of Tax Adjustment of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, to examine, change or reduct but not increase any budget, tax levy or rate of the various Municipal units of said County; to hold such budget within the total amount of revenue to be raised therefor from any source whatsoever and to reduce such budget in accordance therewith; and,

WHEREAS, in the event said Board shall make such revision, change or reduction, in any budget, levy or rate, it shall be in a written order, signed by the Chairman and filed with the County Auditor, indicate any change made in the rate or levy and the revision, change or reduction made in the budget; and,

WHEREAS, said Board is limited in such changes, revision or reductions if any be made, only in respect to the total amounts budgeted for each office held within each of the budget classifications as prescribed by the State Board of Accounts; and,

WHEREAS, said Board is not authorized to revise, change or reduce the detailed items included in such budgeted classifications; and,

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of Indiana limit the total of all tax rates on property within any municipal corporation for all municipal corporations which the property therein is taxable, except in certain instances to One Dollar and Twenty Five (\$1.25) Cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable preperty therein, in territories outside of the corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Towns, and limits the rate of Two Dollars (\$2.00) on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in territories inside corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Towns; and,

WHEREAS, said Board has endeavored to limit the aggregate of the tax rates in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the State of Indiana, and

NOW, pursuant to, and in conformity with said laws, we do hereby revise, change and reduce said budgets and fix and determine the tax levies of the following municipal corporations of Vanderburgh County, in the State of Indiana, as follows:

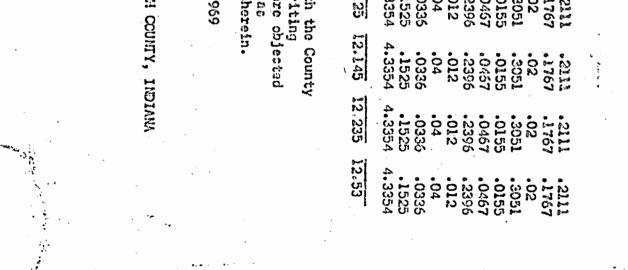

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#### TAX ADJUSTMENT BOARD PROPOSED RESOLUTION

#### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, each of these representatives of our government has indicated in these comments that many tax dollars can and should be saved by such central purchasing agency and,

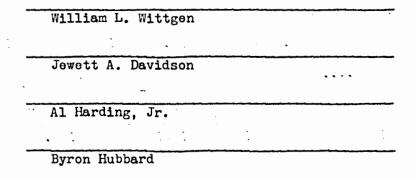
WHEREAS, each of these representatives has expressed a willingness to establish a non-partisan agency to serve all elements of government.

VANDERBURGH COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING.....OCTOBER 7, 1969

The Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, State of Indiana, met in session this seventh day of October, 1969, at 8:30 a.m. with the following members present: Al H. Harding, Jr., President, Irene E. Mooney, William J. Brune, Otto P. Niethammer, Paul Kinney, Robert Lutz, and Gilmore F. Diekmann. Also present; Lewis F. Volpe, County Auditor and County Attorney, Russell Lloyd. Reporters present: Fred Sievers, Chuck Leach, Pete Swain, Alton Brown and Ron Lyles.

Meeting opened by Chief Deputy Sheriff, Richard O'Risky.

A quorum being present the Auditor presented to the Council proof of publication and certificate of mailing of notice....found to be sufficient and in accordance with the law.

County Commissioners met on September 22, 1969, to give their approval for request of Council Call. Said request presented today.

#### COUNTY TREASURER

Frank Tilford, County Treasurer, appeared to explain his request for additional funds in Account 3-211, office supplies. Said when he took over the office that he had to buy several different supplies to replenish the office supplies. This is a transfer of funds from the 3-102, salary of deputies account.

#### SHERIFF

Chief O'Risky explained the Sheriff's need for additional funds in the 5-206 Account, meals for prisoners. Normally the jail runs higher during the months of October, November and December and they did not have enough money in the account to pay the bills for September.

Mrs. Mooney asked if they are being reimbursed by the City for the prisoners the second city police bring in...answer "no."

#### PIGEON TWP. ASSESSOR

Maynard Rogers, Pigeon Township Assessor, appeared to explain his request for Account 9F-103, extra deputies. He has been operating with one extra deputy for the last month.... would like to have two deputies for the rest of the year. He needs \$758.00 to finish out the year instead of the \$2,100.00 he asked for.

#### COMMISSIONERS

County Attorney, Russell Lloyd, explained Account 19-408B, Library books. This is for a set of Burns Statutes. There are no books in the immediate area of the Council room.

## CUMULATIVE BRIDGE FUND

County Surveyor, Sam Biggerstaff, explained Account 191-44, Speaker Road Bridge. This is for a bridge on Speaker Road that collapsed a class in the

Mr. Niethammer asked how the other bridges were coming along that the Council had allowed monay for. Mr. Biggerstaff is going to have a sheet drawn up with all the bridge status on it and give to the Councilmen.

When questioned about the St. George bridge Mr. Biggerstaff explained that they are haveing trouble with the railroads. Railroad wants the county pay the cost and the law will not allow them to do this. Councilman Harding asked Mr. Biggerstaff to come back to the meeting in December to let the Council know what has happened in the meantime on the St. George Bridge.

#### RE: COMMISSIONER'S REQUEST FOR REVOLVING FUND

County Attorney, Russell Lloyd, explained the Commissioner's request to establish a revolving fund to be used to reproduce and sell maps and to purchase any necessary thereto....contour maps were made by Ludwig and Company, of Seymour, Indiana. Maps can be reproduced and sold to non-government offices. Money from the sale of these maps could be put in a revolving fund. Commissioners are asking that they be allowed to set up an account for this to take in the money and buy supplies. Maps are in the Surveyor's office and the Planning Commissioner's office.

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The following Ordinance was set up for this revolving fund:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of County Commissioners be authorized to establish a revolving fund to be used to reproduce and sell planometric and contour maps and to purchase supplies necessary therefore.

Councilman Diekmann moved that the above Ordinance be approved. Councilman Lutz seconded the motion. Motion.carried.

#### AIRPORT AUTHORITY

Howard Trockman, Attorney for Airport Authority, explained the plans are the same as they were when he had appeared before the Council before. The interest rate was 5% when the plans were first made...it is now 7%. He thinks they can get the bonds for 5.8% or 6%. Mr. Leich explained that criticism of the plan was that they did not have separate holding rooms for each of the air lines. Each air line has taken the plan and are coming back the 10th of November to talk with them. Mr. Leich thinks that by 1975 there will have to be more expansion. Modification of this terminal can be used for other offices at such time in the future when they may have to build another building.

Mrs. Mooney asked how this air board bond issue will effect the tax rate. Mr. Trockman said he believes it will be  $1^{\phi}$  or  $1^{\frac{1}{2}\phi}$  more...but there will also be more income from the airport.

Mr. Brune commented on the Indianapolis mishap in air control...wonders what obligation we owe to the commercial air lines. Should people as tax payers be obligated for air control or should the air lines furnish their own air safety? Mr. Trockman feels that Mr. Brune is not alone in this thinking because several members of the Board have had these same thoughts.

Mr. Kinney moved that the Council approve the Airport Bond. Mr. Diekmann seconded the motion. Motion carried.

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County Assessor has said that he will give the Pigeon Township Assessor help from his Reassessment Account in his office for the rest of the year.

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Commissioner's library books account to be spent for a set of Burn's Statutes and Supplements.

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Mr. Harding said that the Tax Adjustment Board thinks the county employees are not being treated as well as the city employees because some did not get a raise in salary and are going to be working a forty hour week...would like for the Council to reconsider the hospital insurance for the employees. Mr. Harding told the Tax Adjustment Board that he would bring the insurance matter back before the Council, and take the matter before the State Tax Board in December for them to leave enough money in the budget so that they can restore the hospital insurance to the Commissioner's budget.

Mr. Kinney said that he will not vote for the money being restored this year. He would be for it in 1971. The reason for this is that all the tax payers are revolting now...he doesn't feel the tax payers can afford any more this year. Mr. Lutz and Mr. Niethammer said they would also go along with what Mr. Kinney had said.

Mr. Brune said since the city employees are getting it he can not see the differentiation between city and county employees.

Mr. Harding noted that county employees will be working 12% more time for 0% more dollars in some cases if they work the forty hour week.

Several veteran's organizations have asked what the solution is about the the Coliseum. Mr. Harding said that possibly they could use facilities at the Conrad Baker Foundation or the Annex. Mr. Niethammer thinks that the Coliseum should not be town down, especially since it is a memorial to the veterans. Mr. Brune noted that the Commissioners had sent a letter to all the different organizations stating that they were not responsible for the money being taken out of the budget. He thinks that some of the Commissioners should have been at the meeting to defend their request for the money. It was also pointed out that one day a group is here complaining about money being spent and the next day a group is wanting to spend more money on the Coliseum. Mrs. Mooney thinks that it is the community's responsibility to provide a meeting place for them.

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The Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, State of Indiana, met in session this 18th day of November, 1969, at 8:30 a.m., with the following members present: Al H. Harding, Jr., Irene E. Mooney, William J. Brune, Otto P. Niethammer, Paul Kinney, and Robert Lutz. Also present: County Auditor, Lewis F. Volpe and Chief Deputy Auditor, William J. Wittekindt, Jr., County Attorney, Thomas Lockyear and Russell Lloyd. Also in attendance were John Munger, representing the Chamber of Commerce and newsmen Fred Sievers, Chuck Leach, Alton Brown, Ron Lyles and Joel Deckard.

Meeting was opened by Sheriff, Jerry Riney.

A quorum being present the Auditor presented to the Council proof of publication and certificate of mailing of notice...found to be sufficient and in accordance with the law.

The State Board of Tax Commissioners have advised the Auditor that they will not be receptive of any appropriations without repeals.

#### CLERK

Joe O'Day appeared to explain his need for additonal appropriations. It is for Account 1-402, Committment of Patients to State Institutions.

#### SHERIFF

Sheriff, Jerry Riney, appeared to explain his need for additional funds...needs money for gas, oil and tires to keep cars on the road. Jail budget in the commissioners budget is for medical expense of prisioners. After checking his salary account Sheriff Riney said that he had \$1,300.00 that he can repeal in December.

#### PERRY TWP. ASSESSOR

Need for additional appropriations of funds was explained by Ben Bockstege. This is for a transfer of funds, from 9E-201B, postage and 9E-213 rent to 9E-103, extra deputies and 9E-201D, Transportation.

#### JUVENILE COURT

This need for extra money was explained by Judge Merrell, for Account 13-201E, Transfer of children and misc., in the amount of \$3,500.00 This is a repeal of funds from Account 13-102D, Salary-Probation Officers.

This Account 13-201E, is used for run away children and physical examinations before child is entered in institutions. Mr. Harding asked how much of the money from the Educational Adjustment Center is for this. Judge Merrell answered approximately \$2,000.00. COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Judge Buente explained Account 19-408B, Law books. The cost of books has increased 25% to 30%. Library is also used by two schools, Evensville University and Indiana State University....the courts must have a law library. The books come automatically with the new subjects in the law coming out.

#### COURTHOUSE

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Supt., of Buildings, Jack Harness...funds that are being repealed in the Commissioner's budget, Account 19-205A, repairs to County buildings. He reported that in Account 14-202, heat, light, power and water needs extra money because there is a past due electric bill now in the amount of \$651.93 for the months of August, September and October. Account 14-207, fuel, is for coal, account 14-213, other operating expense, is for light bulbs and pest control. When questioned by Mr. Lutz about who is maintaining the boilers at the Courthouse; Mr. Harness answered the county, with a possibility of some Lockyears College students maintaining them for two or three hours at night. Beginning next year it is Mr. Harness understanding that the Conrad Baker Foundation will help with the expenses of the Courthouse.

#### COUNTY AGENT

Herschel Whitham, County Agent, appeared to expalin the need for extra funds in this budget. This is a repeal of funds from Account 14-102, Salary account, to 17-201C, Transportation account. The reason for this is because mileage increasing caused by trips to Purdue University for the area redistricting.

#### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Mr. Wesley Bowers spoke on Account 19-433, County Wide Government Study Commission. To do a proper job it became necessary to have a staff. University of Evansville brought forth a proposal to staff the Study Commission. They wanted to commence November 1st.

Mr. Harding asked if money is not avialable until after the first of the year would it impair the program? Mr. Bowers answered that it would not as they would operate on an I.O.U. basis until the first of the year.

The Mayor and the City Council endorsed the program favorably.

Mr. Bowers said that past studies would be included. The new study that they have in mind is much broader than the past study. He also, said the study would possibly run until September of next year. Approximately \$13,000.00 of the \$17,000.00 asked for, from the City and County, would be for salaries.

John Munger said that the Chamber of Commerce wanted to express support for this Bovernment Study program. Evansville's Future, Inc., also, is supporting this. Dr. Wallace Graves also spoke for the Study program. He feels that the cost is very small in comparison to some research studies.

Cliff Arden, President of Teamsters Union, said that Union has long been in support

of this study. So many studies have died after they were started and would like to have some assurance that this would not happen this time.

Mr. Bowers said that the report is to be presented to Legislative Advisory Committee. Will depend on Labor Union, Chamber of Commerce, County officials and Legislators to follow through with it. Mr. Arden thinks that a bi-partisan should present the study to Legislature. He thinks that sometimes a bi-partisan can do better than Union or Chamber of Commerce.

#### VOTERS REGISTRATION :

Ernest Winfield appeared to explain the need for additional funds for Account 22-602, equipment. This is a repeal of funds from Account 22-201B, Postage. This equipment is for tables, they are needed on or before January 1st. BURDETTE PARK

This additional appropriation was explained by Mrs. Louise DeVoy. This is a repeal of funds from Accounts 23-213B, disinfectants, 23-301, buildings, hardware and lumber, 23-602, equipment and 23-602C, vehicles to Account 23-601, improvement to buildings and structures. She explained that this would be used for new rest rooms in the Bishea Building and disposal plant. Would like to do it before the weather gets bad. This would make the building more desirable and would bring in more income for the park. Mrs. DeVoy has had some business men tell her that they would be glad to pay a higher rent fee if this were done.

#### COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

This budget was explained by Charles Althaus. This is a transfer of funds from Account 187-102C, engineers, inspectors and design engineers, 187-205, truck and machine repair and 187-302, gravel to Account 187-308, asphalt and road oil, 187-301, stone, 187-102B, wages truck and tractor drivers and machinists, and 187-311A, flares and barricades (rental). He explained maintaining own flares they spent over \$1,000.00 in the first six months. They can be rented for  $26\phi$  a day. In rental service they repair and replace for the  $26\phi$  day.

#### CUMULATIVE BRIDGE FUND

Sam Biggerstaff, County Engineer, explained this need for extra money. There are two bridges on #6 School Road that have to be replaced. One was hit by a truck and one was broken by trucks when they were building the new road. Mr. Biggerstaff noted that when a bridge is sixty years old it is almost impossible to collect any insurance when a bridge is that old. Account 191-45, Eichoff Road bridge, this is for an overpass and bridge near Indiana State University. Account 191-46, Maryland street bridge, this bridge had to be closed to traffic because the girders were pulling away from the floor of the bridge.

#### BOEHNE CONVALESCENT CENTER

Henry Harness appeared to explain this need for extra money. This is a transfer of funds from Account 198-700, fees, attending physician and others and 198-219.24, major moveable equipment to Account 198-610.02, nurses aides and 198-801.14, diet maids.

He said that since the operation of Boehne Convalescent Center is questionable he has

hesitated to buy any major appliances for the kitchen that would cut down on the help.

AREA PLAN COMMISSION

Wayne Rafferty appeared to explain that Account 250-602, purchasing and renting equipment is a new account. This is a transfer of funds from 250-102, salary account. The Federal Government is picking up some of the salary account. Will be paid back by the Federal Government as they are billed for it. They need three new typewriters; are trading

in two old ones. Want to rent a calculator machine.

#### WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Mr. Dale Work explained his need for additional appropriations. He said that Account R-200, operational expense-County owned institutions is due to the fact ant food costs at Hillcrest and Washington Homes is 15% higher.

#### EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH LEVEE AUTHORITY DISTRICT

Mr. Shrote, Supt., appeared to explain this budget. This is a transfer of funds from Accounts M-11, salaries, M-25, repairs, M-27, Central garage repair service, M-37, other supplies, M-44, other materials and M-56, premiums on official bonds to Accounts M-22, heat, light, power, sewage and water, M-24, printing and advertising, M-32, garage & motor, M-42, street, alley and sewer materials and M-43, repair parts. This is needed for repair of trucks, to pay utility bills, for concrete to the down rip rap and to repair equipment.

#### EVANSVILLE-VANDERBURGH AIRPORT AUTHORITY DISTRICT

The appropriation of funds and the repeal of funds were reversed when advertised, therefore, Mrs. Mooney moved that Airport requests for funds be approved and then readvertised in the December Council Call. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Munger said that since we have a new president and a new budget coming up he suggest works of action for Council to contemplate.

 Have present at each Council meeting the ledger running account of each department. This would be a guide to have a source to look to.
 Set out a policy, a stringent defination, as to what compensates an emergency; put it in the form of a policy or resolution.

Mr. Harding said that they do have paper work from the offices and do have knowledge of the account; then he asked Mr. Kinney and Mr. Brune to meet with County Attorneys to try to decide just what is an emergency. - -The two enclosed resolutions were voted on by the Council and passed unanimously. Since State certification for Boehne Hospital to operate as a tuberculosis hospital has been withdrawn and the Attorney General of the State of Indiana and the State Board of Accounts have ruled that operational control of Boehne is now in the Board of County Commissioner's budget and the Auditor of Vanderburgh County still maintains in the books and records a fiscal account for Boehne, a resolution was made authorizing the Auditor to close out the Boehne Hospital Fund and transfer all moneys, obligations and rights of said fund to the Vanderburgh County General Fund. Mr. Volpe noted that Boehne will have outstanding bills coming due and also some accounts receivable coming in after the first of the year; without this authority he can not pay the bills nor collect accounts receivable.

Mr. Kinney moved that the following resolution be passed and Mr. Niethammer

#### RESOLUTION

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Auditor of Vanderburgh County, Indiana is hereby authorized and directed to terminate and close out the Boehne Hospital Fund and transfer all moneys, obligations and rights of said fund to the Vanderburgh County General Fund.

#### COLISEUM

Jack Harness appeared to explain this need for additional appropriations. He explained that it would take \$13,500.00 to place boiler in Coliseum. They have assurance from two requtable firms that they can get a new boiler for this price. In Account 20-202-heat, light, power & water....\$3,000.00 is an estimated figure to operate boiler and utility bills for the year of 1970. Mr. Diekmann asked if these figures for the new boiler is a verbal agreement or written? Mr. Harness replied it is a written agreement.

Mrs. Mooney asked if the new boiler, for less money, would be of the same quality as the used one? Mr. Harness explained that removing the old boiler from the present location is quite costly. The new boiler has 2,500,000 B.T.U. To his knowledge it is approximately the same size as boiler in old City Building.

County Commissioner James Buthod feels that if Veterans could take over the running of the Coliseum they might take better advantage of it than the County can afford to give them. He said the County Commissioners recommend that County take over the heating for this heating season and then work out a lease with the Veterans for them to take over the maintenance and management of the Coliseum. He noted that there are numerous Veterans' organizations using the Coliseum...a "not for profit" organization could be formed. When Conrad Baker Foundation was mentioned Mr. Buthod explained the Conrad Baker Foundation is different because it is trying to preserve a building:..the Veterans have as their goal the use of the building.

Mr. Harding said that it was his understanding that even though the Council would authorize this money for the Coliseum that the Commissioners would not authorize the expenditure without the lease understanding with the Veterans. Mr. Buthod said this is correct.

Mrs. Mooney said that at the time the budgets were reviewed last September if the Commissioners had explained just what they had proposed for the Coliseum at that time they would probably have given the money. She feels they need proper communication with each other.

John Munger said that the Chamber of Commerce is in agreement with the proposal of the Commissioners...that is with a \$1.00 a year lease to the Veterans.

Frank Wipf, Adjutant for Veterans' Council, appeared to talk in behalf of the Veterans. He said that most of the Veterans that are housed in the Coliseum are not rich...said that they will study this proposition. He feels that money that was taken in by the Coliseum in the last several years should have been put in a separate fund and now there would be enough money to operate the Coliseum.

Mr. Wipf said the Veterans' Council is made up of thirteen different organizations. He turned in the following petition signed by interested parties in behalf of the Coliseum:

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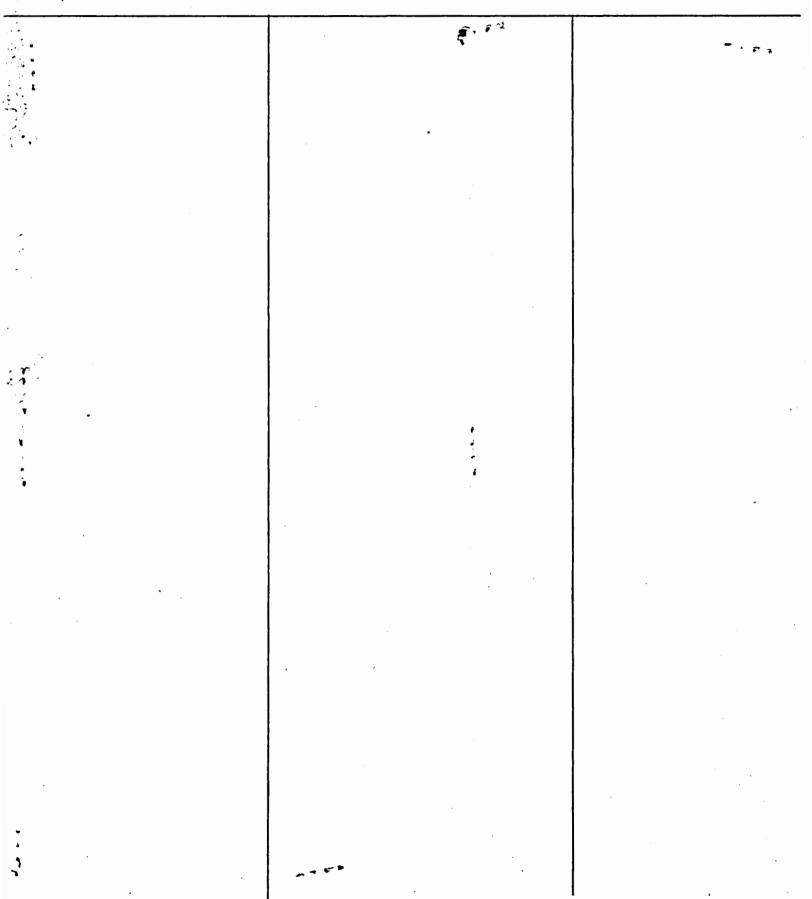

Mr. Harding thankod every one for coming and explained the voting procedure to them...that all requests for appropriations would be heard before they voted. He told them the Council is most interested in what happens to them and hopes that things will get better for them. Mr. Wipf said they would appreciate anything that can be done for them.

County only has insurance on the other person and the person who hit it had no insurance. He feels that if they can advertise for all new cars together they might get them cheaper.

Mr. Kinney said he would like for the County Commissioners to check and see how much it would cost for the County to extend coverage on the county cars. COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Commissioner Buthod explained Account 19-433, Government Study Committee. He said the University of Evansville has commenced their study.

John Munger said that the Chamber of Commerce urges Council to approve this. Mr. Harding noted that the Council had passed a Resolution at their last meeting approving this.

Commissioner Buthod explained that the Commissioners passed the raise at \$200.00 a person instead of the \$700.00 that could be given them. The request from Voters' Registration was for \$700.00 but new statute would have allowed \$1500.00. COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPT.

This Account, 187-R & S #1, was explained by County Engineer, Sam Biggerstaff. He explained this monoy is from the 7th and 8th cent on gasoline. The 1970 allocation is \$419,298.86. This money will be monthly checks from the State Highway Department, as it comes available. This money will be used for the construction of interchange road over State Road 62 near Indiana State University, reconstruction and relining and over pass over L & N tracks just west of Peerless Road.

He said that if County does not use this money within four years the City will have the opportunity to use it.

HEALTH DEPT.

This Account 234 was explained by Dr. Arnold Brockmole. He introduced three

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members from the Board of Health who were present. They were Mr. Adami, Dr. McKenzie and Mr. Kamman. He explained that this money will be used for nursing services. He was there to ask that the money that Council had for the Public Health Nursing Assn., be appropriated to the Health Department. Mr. Adami said that a director is not on the pay roll now. The salaries are slightly higher than what the nurses were getting at P.H.N.A. but they are not getting the fringe benefits from the Health Dept., that they were getting at P.H.N.A. Also, they have jobs with more responsibility now than they had at P.H.N.A.

Council requested that at budget time Health Department break down the amount ... they want into categories, rather than have it as just a line item.

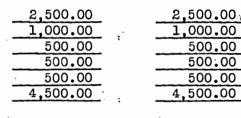

He said they have already spent the money allocated for 1970 and more....still \$2,000.00 in bills left to pay. He reminded Council that he has no control over this budget and it fluctuates; one month it will be higher than other months.

The State Board of Tax Commissioners cut this budget because the General Fund balance was too low.

Jack Harness appeared to request money to continue services for the old Court House. Half of this money will be turned back to the General Fund.

Mr. Kinney suggested that since we will be getting half back to only allocate half of the money requested. Mr. Harness said that it was the opinion of County Attorney that due to the liability insurance of the help, the County should pay all of this amount and then be reimbursed by the Conrad Baker Foundation. The \$936.00 being used to pay the watchman ordinarily would be spent for' mowing weeds and cleaning up debris.

Mrs. Mooney asked when payment can be expected from the Conrad Baker Foundation. Mr. Leich siad that they have the money in the bank and will be happy to pay it whenever they are billed.

#### AREA PLAN COMMISSION

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Wayne Rafferty.

This account 250-602, Renting of Equipment is for office machines. He explained

they now have one new typewriter and one calculator and may possibly need two or

three more typewriters. They bill the State quarterly and are reimbursed for this amount.

This budget was explained by Charles Althaus. Account 187-Road and Street #1 (Eichoff Road) was explained last month by Sam Biggerstaff....being the 7th and 8th cent on gasoline tax that is being spent near Indiana State University for over-pass and access roads. Account 187-311-A, Rent of Flares & Barricades...he explained that during the first six months of last year a little over \$1100.00 was spent for helf in tending to these barricades. Rental agency is responsible now. He feels that \$3,000.00 can be saved by renting the barricades and flares.

Mr. Brune noted that people were witnessing a "first" today as this is the first time that a lady has presided over the County Council.

Albert Breedlove appeared to tell Council that he had a letter from the State saying that the County Home would have to be Certified in order to be eligible for Medicaid for the Welfare patients...will have to hire a full time registered nurse in order to be certified. He needs \$1,900.00 more to pay her salary for the rest of this year. He said that he is explaining this now as he will not be Superintendent of the County Home in March when this request comes before the Council.

Mrs. Mooney told Mr. Breedlove that she wanted to compliment he and Mrs. Breedlove on the fine job they had done at the County Home and that she and the rest of the Council wish them a long and happy retirement.

Mr. Kinney noted that during the last month both Mr. Brune and Mr. Lutz . have lost their father and Council wishes to express their sympathy.

Mrs. Mooney wondered what happened concerning the Veteran's Service Officer. Was told by Mr. Volpe that County Attorney, Thomas Lockyear, said that to his knowledge the County Council did not have to approve this Officer, therefore, he deleted all wording that mentioned the County Council and returned it to the State.

Mr. Niethammor said that he had a call from the Soil and Water Conservation office and there will be a meeting with contractors and city officials at the Executive Inn at noon today. There will be pictures shown on roads and different projects to show how money is being spent.

Mrs. Mooney noted that Mr. Breedlove had asked for their support in hiring of registered nurse for County Home. Council indicated they would act favorably on this when asked for the money.

Mrs. Mooney said that she had a letter from Mr. Speer, of the Southwestern

Indiana Adult Mental Health. This letter was to keep Council informed as to what is going on in their organization. Mr. Diekmann said that he is on the Board of this organization and he has asked Mr. Speer to do this and feels that Mr. Harding should invite them to meeting to explain this and to keep Council informed so Council will know more what is going on before budget time in September. Meeting reconvened at 1:00 p.m. with one other member, Paul R. Kinney,

A quorum being present the Chief Deputy Auditor presented to the Council proof of publication and certificate of mailing of notice...found to be sufficient and in accordance with the law.

Mr. Harding read a letter from County Auditor, Lewis F. Volpe, in regard to bookkeeping machines in his office. They will continue to be available only if the machines are going to be leased or purchased next year. Mr. Volpe explained the cost of these machines are \$385.00 per month to lease.

Mr. Harding said that there is no way that Council can give a firm committment until the budgets are reviewed in September.

Mr. Brune said in view of certain developments and insinuations that he might not be sitting on Council legally he has hired Mr. John Clouse, Attorney, to represent him as to whether he is eligible or not.

Mr. Clouse said Mr. Brune asked him to represent him as he is a Republican and Mr. Brune is a Democrat so as to make it a non-political contest. He thinks that it is more than just the question of Mr. Brune being on the Council. It is the question of disfranchising the voters who elected him...should maintain the trust and integrity of the voters. Mr. Clouse further said there is another problem, that is the problem of taxation. Mr. Brune paid his tax bill in the township from which they say he is not. It is extremely important that these people taxed have proper representation in that unit of government. He said Mr. Brune has every legal right to held this office and his advice is for him to "sit right in his chair for the rest of his term".

Mr. Kinney commented, both as a member of Council and as an officer of the Republican Contral Committee, he felt there would be no question raised about this issue. He said the Republican Central Committee felt that the people had elected him so he should remain until the end of his term.

Mr. Harding asked if there is any action that Council should take. Mr. Clouse

said "no there is not".

Mr. Buthod said as Commissioners they were charged with the duty of relocating précinct boundaries. He also said that they have not, at any time, raised the question of Mr. Brune retaining his seat as there is no one to realize any advantage for raising this question.

Er. Harding said that since there were no other questions they will accept

Mr. Clouse's opinion.

#### SUPERICR COURT

Judge Dietsch explained this need for additional appropriations. He said when the new courts were created the legislature required that each judge have a bailiff and a riding bailiff. It is the opinion of all the judges of the court that these bailiffs are necessary.

County Attornay, Russoll Lloyd, said that there is a serious legal problem involved here. There are legal means whereby the courts can hire their bailiffs. Judge Distsch said that he has always disliked being arbitrary and wants to work with the Council. He does not want to mandate the funds. He also said in their judgment these people are necessary for the proper function of the court.

Judge Newman said that the court has to be designed to meet a peak load. He said often there are times when all four courts are in session at the same time.

Judge Buente noted that bailiff and court reporter go into court when court is in session. One clerk has to stay in office so that they do not have to close the office.

Judge Merrill sind the statute does require that they have these three persons. They have always that these and he believes they should be allowed to keep them. <u>AUDITORIUM</u>

Mr. Buthod explained this need for additional appropriations, for tickets and brochures. Burkert-Walton bid on the job. Croative Press did not bid. Mr. Berkert failed to sign his bid so they will have to re-advertise for bids. Would like to request that this appropriation be granted.

Council noted that Mr. Drossback should have repealed some funds in an amount not less than \$500.00.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

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Commissioner Buthed explained this budget. He noted there is a balance due on the rent, due to a mathematical error. He said they will not puch the matter of the purchasing agent now, as they are drawing up a new proposal which is not ready yet.

Mr. Harding noted that this is the third time that this has done before the Council and wondered why. Mr. Buthod said that the commissioners still feel that a purchase agency can established. They keep thinking that they will be ready and can pursue the difference of opinions.

Mr. Harding said that he assumed by what he is saying that he does not expect any action to be taken at this meeting. Mr. Buthod said "that is correct".

Mr. Buthod feels that having three County Commissioners is archaic ... feels

there should be only one man for the job and one focal point of government for the

county such as the Mayor is for the city....have a full time executive that is elected. Mr. Harding and Mr. Buthod are going to meet to discuss giving some kind of

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proposal to the Government Study Committee, concerning this.

#### COURTY HIGHNAY

Charles Althaus explained this budget. Account 187-301, Stone. They have deleted the present account because of the severe winter and the flooding. Mr. Lutz asked how many are still rock roads. Mr. Althaus replied about 250 miles, however, they use rock on shoulders of roads too. Account 187-401, Insurance Premiums...the workman's compensation raised this year, there were several claims last year. Account 187-403, Ditch Payments....ditches are let out on contract for cleaning. Account 187-602, equipment, for two new tractors and one new bush-hog.

#### CUMULATIVE BRIDGE

County Surveyor, Sam Biggerstaff, expalined these accounts. He said they are inquiring of the landowners of Old Henderson Road if it is all right to do away with the bridge there, as present bridge is used for overflow water and road is seldom traveled at that time.

Ur. Harding commented they have the new budget from Evansville Association for Retarded Children that they had asked for.

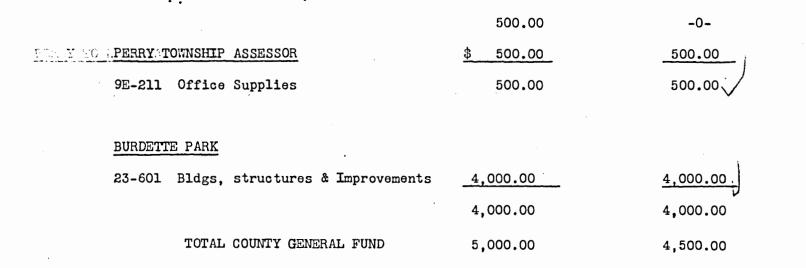

#### REVIEW OF BUDGETS FOR 1971

#### CENTER TWP. ASSESSOR

This budget was explained by Assessor, Alvin Stucki. He explained account 602, Equipmont, adding machine needed because he is using his own personal one and not one furnished by the County.

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Chick Shively, representing the Chamber of Commerce, asked that council hold raises to 5<sup>#</sup> and also hopes the number of employees to County offices can be cut...there are certain offices where they recommend an increase in the number of employees. CLERK OF CIRCUIT COURT

Clerk, Joseph F. O'Day, explained this budget. He has asked for \$200.00 raises in most cases. Four that were now last year have at least a year's experience now and he is asking for a \$400.00 a year raise for them, as they are doing as much work as the others now. In the area of Court Clerks, who are every efficient and are as qualified as any one in the courts...he foels that they should have more money, to rotain personnel, because people working courts get much more money. Mr. Harding asked how many less people he has than in St. Joe County which is comparable to Vanderburgh? Mr. O'Day answered "nine less".

Mr. O'Day said he has not been getting cooperation from the Building Authority when it comes to moving boxes and supplies. They are too heavy and too bulky for ladies to move. The 103 account for Part Time Employees is basically for maintenance costs.

#### COUNTY ELECTION BOARD

Mr. O'Day explained this budget also. This budget i down because there is onlay a City Election next year. City pays for the City election, but County Election Board has to present the budget. Account 405C, Janitor Service for Public Buildings is a new Account.

RECESSED: 12:00 noon

Meeting reconvened at 1:00 p.m., after lunch.

#### TREASURER

This budget was explained by Chief Deputy, Florence Bruck. She explained Account 201D, Transportation for Outside Deputy, in the amount of \$500.00....asking a reduction of \$500.00 in his salary account but giving him a transportation of \$500.00 which he had not had before, for mileage.

Account 205, Repairs to Equipment...asking for an additional \$500.00 in this account due to increased cost of labor.

Account 211, Office Supplies, is reduced because they are going to use the

"C" copies of the tax bills.

Mrs. Bruck said that she does not feel that they can get by without all the extra help.

Mrs. Mooney commented that she thought Mrs. Bruck should be complimented on the fine job she is doing in running the Treasurer's office while Mr. Tilford is away. SHERIFF

This budget was explained by Shoriff, Jerry Rine, he sind the 1022 account, Salary of Probationary Patrolman is a transfer of men from Judge Miller's budget to the Sheriff's budget. These men will not be under the merit system. When the bailiffs that there now retire they will be replaced by regular deputies.....where they can be covered by insurance. Bailiffs do sheriff's functions and really should be under the sheriff's dommand.

Account 102F, Salary of Jail matrons...the Statute says that if matrons do like duties of the deputy sheriff then they shall receive like pay. They do some like duties but not all of them, therefore, he is not asking for like pay.

Account 106, Hospitatlization Insurance, should be reduced from \$14,880.00 to \$9,672.00 which is in line with the Evansville Police Department.

Account 201B, Radio Repair & Maintenance...Illinois and Missouri stations are interfering with work. Have had new crystals put in automobiles so they can hear their men. Also, for the installation of new radios when necessary.

201D, Travel Expense. This account is higher because they have needed to send personnel to Seminars which are important to the office training for the men.

Shoriff Riney said he is asking for seven new motor vehicles....two are replacements. He is requesting air conditioning for the first time. He believes it would be a benefit to the whole department to have air conditioned vehicles.

He, also, said he has been trying to get salaries equivalent to the City Policemen. He said his men have more responsibility than City Policemen.

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It was pointed out to Council they could create a new budget and increase a budget with a vote of six out of seven.

#### AUDITORIUL

This budget was explained by manager, Doyle Dressback,....he is asking for an increase of \$2,000.00 for the manager's salary...said the gross revenue is up \$19,000.00 for the first eight months this year.

#### COLISEUL

This budget was, also, explained by Mr. Dressback. He said the Commissioners are still negotiating with the Veterans. As of yet there is no deal. The utilities are left cut...hopes deal can be made. There is nothing definte.

Mrs. Mooney wonders if maintenance man could help with the Auditorium too.

since Coliseum is used so seldom.

#### SURVEYOR

This budget was explained by Sam Biggerstaff. Account 602E, Electric Calculator, in the amount of \$3,000.00. Mr. Biggerstaff said they are using this machine now, on a trial basis, and it does a marvelous job and can save them any man hours. Mrs. Mooney asked what rental would be in comparison to buying it. Mr. Biggerstaff said it would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$200.00 or \$300.00 a month.

#### DRAINAGE BOARD

This budget was, also, explained by Sam Biggerstaff.

#### CORONER

This budget was explained by Deputy Coroner, Earl Cox. He said a vacation clork is needed to take down statements when people come in.

### COUNTY ASSESSOR

This budget was explained by Horace Lukens. He said he was asking for only one account to be raised...201D, Transportation, which is for the Inheritance Tax Deputy.

#### PERRY TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

This budget was explained by Maynard Rogers. He said his girls all do the same work....he asked to create one more deputy and bring her salary up from per-diem work. When Mr. Rogers was asked if he could get by with one less deputy he replied if he did not need the \$3,000.00 for extra deputies he would not use ut.

#### KNIGHT TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

This budget was explained by Emorson "Bud" Reid. Said he does not believe he can operate his office with any less people because he reduced his office staff by one last year.

#### VOTING

#### CLERK OF CIRCUIT COURT

Mr. Brune moved that Account 102, Chief Deputy, be approved as advertised. Mrs. Mooney seconded the motion. Motion failed.

Mr. Diekmann moved that Account 102, Chief Deputy, be approved in the amount of \$8,500.00, the five Court Clerks in the amount of \$5,300.00 and the one Superior Court Clerk, who is now making \$4,100.00, be brought up to the \$5,300.00 the other Court Clerks are now getting, and fourteen deputies at \$4,450.00. Mr. Niethammer seconded the motion. Notion failed.

No. further action taken at this time.

#### REVIEW

#### SUPERIOR COURT

This budget was explained by Judge Merrell....said the Bar association is studying the Courts.

He needs the extra person because the work is behind and this would make the work load easier.

The Public Defender gots half of his salary from Juvenile Court and half

from Circuit Court.

The 602, Equipment, account is for typewriters. Extra clerical is needed because they are swamped with work.

Account 211, Office Supplies....asking for more because every year this account has been inadequate.

RECESSED: 5:00 p.m.

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#### SEPTEMBER 9, 1970

The Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, State of Indiana, met in session this 9th day of September, 1970 at 8:30 a.m. to continue reviewing the budgets for 1971, with all members present.

Meeting called to order by Al H. Harding, Jr., President. CIRCUIT COURT

This budget was explained by Judge Miller. He noted that in most cases he is asking for a 6% raise for his employees. One of the Probation Clerks is a Volunteer Counseller at \$4,600.00. Mrs. Mooney asked if his probation officers have the same education as the other Courts. Judge Miller said "no"...he feels they are well qualified. In the first five years he only had to revoke thirty five probations. Mr. Harding asked if he had to hire a new person would be hire one with a degree? Judge Miller said it would all depend on the circumstances. He said if he thought professional help was needed he would send them to the clinic because he would not want to put a dangerous person out on the street...he also said he would like to put the admitting clerk on the Montal Health payroll...then they would not have to go to the County Clerk's office to be admitted. Many times people should be treated at the Clinic and de not need to go to the State Hospital. He asked Clerk, Joe Ö'Day if he was opposed or for this idea. Mr. O'Day said he was in acceptete accord with what Judge Miller had prepsed.

Mr. Kinney asked if Judge Miller was still in favor of the three bailiffs being on the Sheriff's budget. Judge Miller said "I was and still am but would not want any of the bailiffs discharged....would want them to stay as long as I am in office, which would be another two years". Bailiffs are not armed but when the Judge or Sheriff think it is necessary there is an armed Sheriff in court. Mr. Harding asked if he would relate Court Clerks in the Clerk's office to his legal secretary. Judge Miller said the Court Clerks are very efficient, at least the one that he knows about. Mrs. Mooney asked why there is such a spread in salary, as Court Reporters and Court Clerks? Judge Miller said he feels that a reporter has a more responsible job. Court Clerks keep minutes for permanent records...Court Clerks de not go to Court in Superior Court.

#### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

budget.

This budget was explained by Robert Hayes, Prosecutor....he said he thought both candidates should be there, as it would concern one of them next year.

Mombors of the Council indicated they did not wish to hear the Part Time

Mr. Hayes is asking \$25,000.00 salary for full time Prosecutor of which \$15,000.00 would be paid by State and \$10,000.00 would be County's share. The fifth and sixth deputies would be part time. There is night court twice a week. Mr. Hayes said he mot with the Bar Association four or five months ago and discussed this budget with them.

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Mrs. Mooney said she thinks it is so important for the Prosecutor to have competent men that maybe he could come up with a more efficient staff if they would allow a lump sum for the deputies and leave it to the Prosecutor's discretion as to the salaries and number of deputies.

Mr. Hayes said the first deputy would get 7,500.00 from the State a total of \$17,500.00.

Rodney Groves, candidate for Prosecutor, asked to present a proposed budget.. said office can be staffed with people to work on full time basis. He foels that salaries of secretaries should all be equal. He would have dictating machine instead of the other secretary. Every employee in Prosecutor's office would be full time and no part time employees.

Mr. Hayes said he thought it would be nice if candidate would come to the Prosecutor's office and see what there is to do. There is a lot of walk-in people to be heard.

Bailey Merrill, representing the Citizens Crime Committee and the Bar Association...are asking for a completely new approach. He thinks a full time Prosecutor's office is necessary for this. Wants an entirely different system with full time Prosecutor and deputies.

Mr. Hayes said the only way a full time Prosecutor can "search-out" is to have police and sheriff behind him.

Mr. Brune, who is also a candidate, said he supports a full time Prosecutor because he feels that you can not serve two Masters. He siad the Crime Commission supports a full time Prosecutor but only a full time staff, if there is not a full time Prosecutor. He said "why not see what happens with a full time Prosecutor and one full time deputy at \$17,500.00".

He proposed:

Full Time Prosecutor 1 Full Time Deputy e \$17,500.00

Second through Seventh Deputy 0 \$40,000.00 (in a lump sum) and lot Prosecutor select his own help.

He feels that qualified part time holp would be much better than full time inexperienced men.

Mr. Diekmann asked if he thought they could get by with one Investigator instead of two? Mr. Brune said he thought they could, by using two policemen. Mr. Brune said the only difference between Mr. Grove's and himself is

itemizing the amount of salaries for deputies. He feels salary should be in one

lump sum and let Prosecutor hire his own men.

John Munger said the Chamber of Commerce Taxation Committée supports the full time Prosocutor and full time deputies.

Joe O'Day spoke to the Council as a Citizen taxpayer...said the minute

he becomes a Prosecutor many of the other attorneys spend time trying to tear up

what he is doing ... thinks Council should consider the part time budget of Presecutor

until the new Prosecutor has experience in office.

Ur. Brune said he wanted it known that since he is a representative of the Council to the Tax Adjustment Board he will support the Council with whatever action they take, no matter what his own personal opinion is.

#### SUPT. OF COUNTY BUILDINGS

Herman Hotz explained this budget. Account 103, extra help, was explained as being needed to clear out the sub-basement of the old Court House. It is full of old records. He has received permission to destroy these..., needs the extra help to deliver old records to land-fill to be destroyed. He said the air conditioning is at Hillcrest-Washington Homes and the County Home. They are in the process of moving the air conditioning from old Court House to County Home and have removed five from Boshne and six from old Court House. The 602, equipment account, is for dishwasher at Washington Home ... will have to be replaced.

Mrs. Mooney asked if the Custodian at Coliseum is under his jurisdiction ... wonders if custodian could be available to County for some other functions. Mr. Hotz does not know whose jurisdiction he is under.

#### COUNTY HOME

This budget was explained by Jack Harness. The increase of \$650.00, salary of Supt., is due to the fact that \$200.00 must now be spent for administrator's license and \$250.00 a year for school tuition.

Mr. Brune asked Mr. Harness about the 206, food, account as he had not spent half of it during the first six months. Mr. Harness said when he went out to County Home the shelves were well stocked and they wanted to use all the old food first and then restock the sholves with new. Health regulations will not let them can anything but. they do dreeze food.

#### AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Edwin Cole, as President of Vanderburgh County Extension Board, said budget committee met with Lr. Whitham and his staff to go over the budget for the coming year. He explained account 213, 4-H Clubs & Scott-Vanderburgh Fair ..... this is primarily : . for ribbons and things for the Fair.

#### BUILDING COMMISSIONER

This budget was explained by Ed Roehm. Account 102, Bldg. Inspector and Safety Inspector (full time) is to be used to try to cut down on so many accidents ... so as to cut down on workman's compensation being paid out by insurance company. He had Paul Torian to explain what is happening to the insurance rate.

Mr. Torian explained the insurance rates...loss experience of the County.

If it is good then county would have a savings of 20% or if it is bad it will be raised by 20% or more ... he feels that a safety inspector would cause the county to have a good loss experience.

Mr. Roshm explained account 6020, Testing equipment & Supplies...air conditioning, heating, venting, et., can not be tested without disassembling, with these tools they do not have to be dicassembled.

#### VOTERS' REGISTRATION

This budget was explained by Ernest Winfield. He said the lead will be less next year because there is only a city election and no county election. BURDETTE PARK

Louise DeVoy explained this budget. Mr. Brune question account 103, Other Employees, asked if it was for raises or additional employees. Mr. DeVoy said it is for raises. She said she is \$18,000.00 ahead in income this year. She has taken in \$77,000.00 this year and hopes to reach \$90,000.00.

Account 601, Bldgs., Structures & Improvements, is for enlarging small stone cabins to accommodate larger groups. Mrs. DeVoy agreed to out \$4,000.00 from the \$12,000.00 she was asking for in this account. In account 6020, vehiclestractor & truck...needs another tractor and truck. She said they were figuring on \$4,200.00 for the tractor and \$3,050.00 for the truck. Custodian needs truck, sometimes he has to drive his own car.

Mrs. DoVoy emphasized that accounts 202A, electric, & water, and 205, repairs, should not be cut.

#### VOTING

#### CLERK OF CIRCUIT COURT

Mr. Kinney moved that all accounts be approved as advertised with the exception of the deputies, instead of 14, he moved that 13 deputies be approved. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion.

Mr. O'Day said he does not want an employee cut.

Mr. Lutz withdrew his second. Motion failed.

Mr. Brune moved that 102 accounts be approved as presented. Mrs. Mooney seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Dielmann moved that Account 103, part time employees, be approved in the amount of zero dollars and the balance of the budget be approved as advertised. Mr. Kinney seconded, the motion. Motion carried. RECESSED: 12:00 noon for lunch.

#### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

This budget was explained by James Buthod. Account 2010, Telephone and Telegraph, this account is increased by \$5,000.00....this account is out of money new and will have to come back to Council before the end of the year.

Council asked Commissioners to make a survey to see if the offices need as many telephones as they now have.

. Mrs. Mooney asked if 201 and 201D could not be in one account. Answer:

"there is no reason why it can not be".

Commissioner Buthod and Commissioner Stofleth said they know of no reason

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why County should belong to the National Association, therefore, \$688.00 can be

reduced from the 201E, Subscription and Dues account.

Account 204, Printing and Advertising is for legal advertising that appears in the papers.

Account 205A, repairs to County buildings....explained by Herman Hotz.... this is for repairs to Coliseum for the roof and structural damage. The Coliseum will be turned over to the Veterans when lease is prepared by County Attorney, Russell Lloyd.

Mrs. Mooney said she had been thinking that the Coliseum would be a very good building for storage as she had heard that in just a very few years storage was going to be at a premium in the Civic Center.

Account 409, Brucellosis Vaccine and Bovine T.B....this is the first time in six years they have been sent a contract.

Account 414, rent...Mr. Harding is concerned about the parking facilities.... said he thought that County was to be reimbursed by the income from the parking. Mr. Buthod said he thought that was true, therefore, since there is no rate charge for the parking lot it is the same as an increase in rent. On the Auditorium lot, even after paying an attendant, they still are making money on that lot.

Mr. Kinney thinks that the Commissioners should make the Tax Adjustment Board aware of Building Authority budget. Mr. Niethammer said if County pays rent on the parking lot it seemed to him that the County could put attendants on the lot and make some money on it.

Account 438, Southwestern Indiana Montal Health Center, was explained by Eob Spear. This is combined with Child Guidance Center and Adult Montal Health Center. There is a \$15,000.00 increase over last year, due to the building trade strike it is impossible to tell when they will get into the new building, possibly by the early part of next year. Salaries are based on a 7% increase across the board raise.

Mr. Diokmann said the Child Guidance is more than last year...part of this is in raises. Since they are operating the East Side Clinic, is costing \$14,000.00

Account 430, Soil & Water Conservation Study, explained by Tom Pugh. Soil survey study is being used to determine what problems you would have if you developed a certain area and if special handling would be required. Contract will be completed in 1971. This is the last year there will be a request in the budget for it. Mr. Nietharmer said that the Highway Department uses his information too. Mr. Brune said that he wanted to take the opportunity as a Councilman to thank and compliment Mr. Pugh on his work with pollution and his work toward Pigeon Creek. Mr. Buthod said he agroes with Mr. Brune because they, the commissioners, have worked with him and

he has been very helpful to them also.

Account 432, Rotarded Children's Assn., was explained by Mr. Fall....said there is \$5,000.00 more money in budget. This is for a Work Shop Assistant and also to supplement the income of the Development Conter. Since the United Fund did not meet

their quota the Development Center was cut.

Mr. Buthod said the Government Study Commission report is due this month and is to be presented to the Legislature.

Account 435, remapping of precincts....Mr. Harding said that Registration had been asked to do some additional mapping and question was raised if it was some liability on the part of the firm who had contracted to do the job. Mr. Buthod does not feel that there was any discrepancy and as far as he is concerned the contractor fulfilled the contract.

Account 436, employees hospital insurance, Mr. Buthod feels that all employees should furnish hospital insurance to employees. The County would pay for single membership....the employee could pay for family plan....would include all county employees.

There are cortain things that have to be done before money will be paid back from Federal Government to pay for the Land Grant for Burdette Park. These things are to be done by Area Plan.

Commissioner Stofleth spoke on "Dumpsters" for the County. He would like to have a line added to the budget to lease these sixteen containers at a cost of \$4,728.00. These will be distributed out through the County at a convenient location where people could sixpose of their refuge. These containers would be emptied by the County once a week.

Mr. Lutz asked if Commissioners have considered a Pension Plan? Mr. Stofleth said that they have not considered it but think they should and he favors a pension plan. They are planning to look into it.

VETERANS' SERVICE OFFICER

Explained by Cecil Hamman. Mr. Harding asked why he proposed a four months secretary. Mr. Hamman said in November every one drawing a pension receives a questionnaire card to be filled out and has to be back in Indianapolis by January 15. This is in addition to new applications.

Mr. Hamman said the Commissioners supported the Alternate budget with only an Honorary Service Officer.

Mr. Brune said he knew Mr. Ray and he had worked from 8:00-5:00 p.m. and was busy and new he comes along and says that a full time service officer is not needed.

John Munger said the Chamber of Commerce supports the Alternate budget.

Mr. Brune said he felt that the Veterans would want a full time Service Officer. COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

This budget was explained by Charles Althaus.

#### Cliff Arden, of the Termsters Union, was also present....said must get a

pension plan for the people.

RECESSED: 5:00 p.m.

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#### SEPTEMBER 10, 1970

Moeting was opened at 8:00 a.m. by President, Al H. Harding, Jr.

#### VOTING

#### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

. Mr. Brune was not present when mooting began as he wished to abstain from voting on this budget, since he is a candidate for this office.

Mrs. Mooney said she was going to consider the full time budget for the Frosecuting attorney.

Mr. Harding asked if Council wanted to discuss the Alternate budget or the first budget...decision was to discuss the Alternate budget first and then if they wanted to discuss the first budget they could.

Urs. Mooney made a motion account 101, salary of Prosecutor, be approved in the amount of \$10,000.00. Motion failed for lack of a second.

Mr. Diekmann moved that account 101, salary of Prosecutor, be approved in the amount of \$7,500.00. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mrs. Mooney made a motion that account 102, first deputy, be approved in the amount of \$10,000.00. Mr. Kinney seconded the motion. Motion failed.

Mr. Diekmann moved that account 102, first deputy, be approved in the amount of \$7,500.00. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion. Motion failed.

Mr. Niethammer moved that account 102, first deputy, be approved in the amount of \$8,500.00. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mrs. Mooney moved that account 102, second, third, fourth and fifth deputies, be voted on in a lump sum of \$40,000.00. Mr. Diekmann seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mrs. Moonoy moved that all the other salary accounts be passed, with the exception of the last one, which would eliminated. Mr. Niethammer seconded the motion. Motion failed.

Council voted to increase the Chief Investigator's salary to \$3,000.00. This was done by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Diekmann moved that Chief Investigator's salary be approved for \$8,000.00, Chief Investigator-Support, in the amount of \$5,800.00, Investigator's salary be disallowed, the secretary and two assistant secretarys as advertised and the third assistant secretary to be cut out. Mr. Lutz seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Lutz made a motion that Account 104 through 212 be approved as advertised.

Mr. Diekmann seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Diekmann moved that Account 602, Equipment, be increased from zero to \$1,000.00. This was done so the Prosecutor can purchase dictating equipment instead of hiring an extra secretary. Mrs. Meaney seconded the motion. When Council voted.... vote was unanimous in favor of this. Motion carried. Mr. Diekmann made a motion that Account 602B, Law Books, be approved as

advertised. Mrs. Mooney seconded the motion. Motion carried.

#### COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

Dale Work explained this budget. Several things have happened in the past year causing extra expense...among which it has been ruled that a stepfather is no longer responsible for his stepchildren and goes back to August, 1968. Retreactive payments to be made. He said one pay check was issued in excess of \$4,000.00.

Mr. Diekmann asked why so much money was needed in account 403D, assistancecripples children when there had only been \$14,726.18 spent during the first six months of this year? 'Mr. Work said this was because they are not paying bills at the Indiana University Medical Center, as yet, because they are not satisfied with the way the bills are made up.

Mr. Kinney asked why account 404, rents, is so much higher this year. Mr. Work said he is requesting 15% more space..hs seventy five people in office now, where there is space for sixty eight.

Account 407, Public Employees Retirement Charge, is higher because of the personnel request...will be covering more salaries.

Mr. Harding asked Mr. Work if he would like to be present when they vote on his budget? Mr. Work said he would appreciate it.

#### ORDINANCE FOR APPROPRIATIONS

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, That for the expenses of the county government and its institutions for the year ending December 31, 1971, the following sums of money are hereby appropriated and ordered set apart out of the several funds herein named and for the purposes herein specified, subject to the laws governing the same. Such sums herein appropriated shall be held to include all expenditures authorized to be made during the year, unless otherwise expressly stipulated and provided for by law. Provided, however, That disbursements from each appropriation are further limited to the amounts listed for the detail accounts making up such appropriation unless said detail accounts are increased or decreased by another ordinance or resolution of the county council. (If one or more of the detail accounts within an appropriation for an office or department

are increased by not more than the total amount that one or more other detail

accounts within the same appropriation are concurrently decreased by ordinance, or resolution of the county council, neither advertising to the taxpayers nor approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners is required. Other changes affecting more than one appropriation for a department or office or appropriation changes affecting more than one department or office within a fund require advertising, additional appropriation ordinance and approval by the State Board of Tax Commissioners.)

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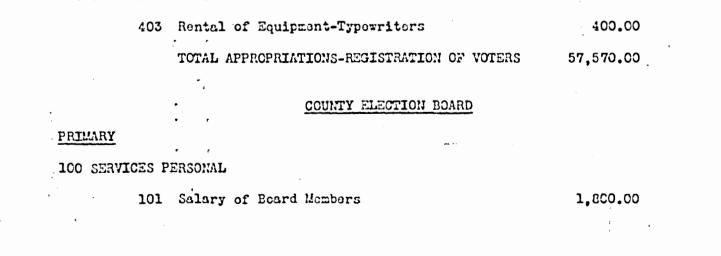

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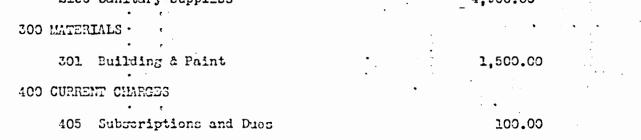

#### ORDINANCE FOR TAX LEVIES

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An Ordinance Levying Taxes and fixing the Rate of Taxation for the purpose of raising

revenue to meet the necessary expense of the County Government and its Institutions for the calendar year 1971

Be It Ordained by the Vanderburgh County Council of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, That:

For the use and benefit of the County Welfare Fund there shall be levied and assessed, in the year 1970, collectible in the year 1971, the sum of 77.cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed valuation of Taxable . Property of said Vanderburgh County, which taxes when collected shall be paid into the County Welfare Fund in the County Treasury.

Chairman Taylor advised members of the Board that it was the duty of this

Beard to review budgets and to cut them if possible, this Board has no authority to raise budgets. This is a non-partisan Board that represents the taxpayers and their interests.

Mr. Minger, representing the Chamber of Commerce said he had two general recommendations partaining to all budgets.

Mr. Munger said the Chamber of Commerce supports the pay raise proposed for policemen and firemen.

When questioned regarding the proposed purchase of thirty (30) new cars, Mayor McDonald explained this was an experiment...each man on a plateon will be assigned a car to be used for general purposes twenty four hours a day.

These cars are not to be taken out of the County. He said a log or record would be kept on the efficitveness of each car...how many arrests are made, etc. This practice of police being assigned a car for twenty four hours has been proven an important factor in reducing crime in the communities where it is being used.

Mr. Munger said the Chamber of Commerce approves of thirty (30) cars as a reasonable number but he urged the Board to consider reducing this to a lower figure if, in the opinion of Board members, this would be feasible.

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At this time, members of the United Taxpayers Association asked to be heard. Mr. Thies, Vice Chairman, read the following statement:

#### TO: THE VANDERBURGH COUNTY TAX ADJUSTMENT BOARD

Mr. Chairman, and Members of the Board:

First of all let us say that we are not here to hinder the progress of our community, but rather we seek and encourage the continual growth of our community. However, the taxpayers of Vanderburgh County are concerned with the continued increase in taxes. They are so concerned with the apparent lack on the part of some officials to reduce government spending that they have formed an organization to speak in their behalf. As representatives of the taxpayers we say that they do not agree with the statement which has

been attributed to a group from the University of Evansville which said "The taxpayers must learn to live with higher taxes".

We cannot caution you enough. The taxpayers of our county now have an organization which is watching the actions of this and all budget committees and offices in Vanderburgh county. If you continue to ignore the people, then you can expect them to start ignoring you, and taking matters into their own hands. Many a great empire has been destroyed because the leaders forget the people. We don't want to destroy our community. Please, don't let this happen here.

• •

As our country was founded on a revolution which, among other things, included opposition to high taxes, so is there another revolution beginning. This is not a revolution with arms, but another kind of revolution against EXCESSIVE government spending. A revolution against UNJUST AND UNNECESSARY expenditures by public employees who lack the integrity and sincerity to see that the taxpayers money is used properly.

Gentlemen, in closing we would like to remind you that it is your duty to examine each of these budgets carefully, and before you approve one item, ask yourself and ask each other:

IS THIS REALLY NECESSARY-or are we padding an account?

IS THIS REALLY NECESSARY-cr are we paying a political debt?

IS THIS REALLY NECESSARY-or are wo spending money fcolishly?

IS THIS REALLY NECESSARY?

Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Thies and assured him this Beard is trying to do just this. When asked if he had any particular item he wanted to talk about, Mr. Thies said he did not think the general fund was being operated properly. He said he did not think any left over from budgeted accounts and then not

used should revert to the general fund. He cited an example of the cost of a building being budgeted for several years...finally was built but the money reverted back to the general fund each time. Mayor McDonald asked Mr. Thies just what this was...Mr. Thies refused to answer. Mayor McDonald said all meetings and all records of the city were open to the public at any time... that even at the meetings on budgets no one but a few hardy souls were interested enough to attend these meetings. He said he would cooperate in any way possible...that he was a taxpayer and very much interested and concorned with rising tax rates.

Mr. Clem Frank spoke briefly and again called attention to the plight of retired people living on fixed incomes. He said we should elect some officials who will go to the legislature and change the present tax structure.

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#### POLICE DEPARTLENT

Discussion was resumed regarding new cars requested and the plan for equipping one platoon with a car for each officer.

Mayor McDonald again expalined that this will be an experiment to see what can be accomplished with the presence of police cars on the streets and if it will prove a deterrment to crim.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion the automotive equipment be cut from the requested thirty (30) cars to twenty four (24). Mr. Story seconded the motion. At this

time it was determined that these cars were in the C.I.C. account and the Tax

Adjustment Board has no power to reduce this fund.

In defense of City budgets, Mayor McDonald said in his 12 years experience

in preparing budgets...these are the best, that he had cut approximately one and one half (1 1/2) million dollars from the original requests. He said the answer to the tax problem, in his opinion, was to get rid of the present antiquated tax structure of Indiana...that the tax base must be changed. He also reported any money due from the State was received later and later.

Mr. Hubbard withdrew his motion and Mr. Story withdrew his second since this Board has no power to change C.I.C. accounts.: No furter action.

POLICE MERIT COMMISSION

Approved as presented.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

In connection with explanation of budget requests of the Fire Department, Mayor MoDonald explained the new alarm system now in practice and suggested the Board visit this facility on the second floor of Civic Center.

No change was made in this budget.

Meeting recessed at 4:00 o'clock until 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, September 15, 1970

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*

September 15, 1970

Meeting called to order at 9:10 a.m. by Chairman Taylor with all members prosent except Mr. Brune who arrived later.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT

It was ascertained that the Health officer no longer retains any fees... these will now go into the General Fund. The question was raised regarding mosquite control and Mr. Hudson, representing the State Board of Accounts explained this money revorts into working balance.

Mr. Story made a motion the Health Department budget be approved as presented. Mr. Noclting seconded motion. Motion carried with Mr. Hubbard voting "nay".

#### AIR POLLUTION CONTROL

Mrs. W rdrip explained this was a new program and that some foderal money is received. John Munger suggested the elimination of the  $\frac{1}{2}$  time clerk typist as this is a new employee not covered by a salary ordinance.

Mr. McDonald noted that Evansville is ahead of any city in Indiana en air pollution control. Mr. Munger questioned the salary of the Smoke Commissioner since the salary ordinance approved \$8,400 and he has been allowed \$9,500. Mayor McDonald explained this salary was set early before the amount of Federal funds to be received was determined. He said the salary ordinance will be amended by a resolution making his salary \$12,000.

No change made in this budget.

#### DOG POUND

#### CENTRAL GARAGE

Discussion regarding charges for Central Garage service.....Mr. Story noted

it would be hard to reconcile this budget. Mayor McDonald and Mr. Noelting

explained the new salary rates were set in March of this year...some salaries

were increased during the year...requests in 1971 budget reflect only a 5% increase.

Mr. Nicholson made a motion this budget be approved as presented. Mr. Brune

seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### CIVIL DEFENSE

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented in the amount of \$13,476.75. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### TALK BY MAYOR MC DONALD

At this time, Mayor McDonald asked to talk to the Board about the \$50,000 cut made from the Street Lighting Account. He pointed out that the lights already installed and others authorized would cost \$841,957 without the addition of any more new lights and since the budget had been cut to \$810,000. he asked what could he do about paying these bills. He suggested if the Board feels it must out this account would they consider in making it for \$25,000. instead of \$50,000. He said a city that is well lighted helps to eliminate crime, traffic accidents, etc. The theory of street lighting used to be a "hit and miss" operation, but now street lighting is put in on even illuminated installation basis...light is evely illumined.

Meeting recessed at 12: 15 for lunch

Mosting called to order at 1:15 p.m. with Chairman Taylor presiding. All members present except Mr. Brune who arrived at 2:00 p.m. . . WILLARD LIBRARY

Budget approved as presented.

#### PARK DEPARTLENT

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented. Mr. Denton seconded motion. Motion carried. RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented. No second. A discussion was started regarding retirement fund. Mr. Taylor said he thought the pension fund idea was premature ... Mayor McDonald pointed out the Public Employees Retirement Fund is the only fund that municipal employees can be covered by. He said he did not ask for any larger salary increases because he wanted this pension fund to be put in effect next year. It is honorable and it is just ... the first question asked when a person is hind is about retirement plan.

Three other second class cities. in the State are going into this plan this year ... private industry, schools, police and firemen have retirement plans ... why not municipal workers. Mr. Denton said he thought this was a good program ... long overdue, that public employees whould be treated like.other employees. Mr. Hubbard said this Board should never set in session if the taxpayers are not going to be considered.

Mayor McDonald said he would like to issue a blanket invitation to Board members to attend budget sessions next and to see for themselves how little interest is shown by the general public. Only four taxpayers appeared at any of the sessions held this year. Mr. Brune explained that the County Council worked whroughout the year .... had appointed different councilmen to represent certain offices and to check. thoroughly the work done by these offices. He said at the County Council budget hearings each office holder appears to explain his budget and is often called back for a second time and that at no time during Council hearings was there any taxpayers

present to make any comment or objection. Mr. Donton said he felt the elected people should determine the policy and that the pension plan is just as vital to public employees as the Park Department or Recreational Department.

At this time, Mr. Brune again made a motion this budget be approved in the amount of \$166,163.50. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Hubbard at first voted "nay" but changed his vote to "aye".

Mayor McDonald asked if it would be possible to act on the general fund account of the City budget requests .... Mr. Taylor said there were still some questions to be considered.

#### ZOO DEPARTMENT

Mr. Brune made a motion the budget of the Zoo Department be approved as presented in the amount of \$236,764.76. Mr. Denton seconded motion.

There were five "ayo" votes, Mr. Hubbard voted "nay". Motion carried. REDEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented in the amount of \$38,242.43. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried with five members voting "aye" and two members abstaining.

#### LOCUST HILL CEMETERY

Mr. Taylor said he would like to say that, in his opinion, this cemetery is not kept up...something should be done regarding the condition of grounds. After discussion, Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved in the amount of \$64,775.56, as presented. Mr. Denton seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### MOTOR .VEHICLE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TRAFFIC ENGINEER TRAFFIC POLICE & SAFETY

Mr. Brune made a motion, seconded by Mr. Noolting that the budget of the Motor Vehicle Highway Department in the amount of \$1,068,432,79, the budget of the Traffic Engineer in the emount of \$187,143.75 and the budget of the Traffic Police & Safety in the amount of \$112,000. be approved. Mr. Hubbard questioned the 1/2 time clerk in the Traffic Engineer's budget...this was also shown in Air Pollution budget. No action. When put to a vote, motion carried.

.. The question was asked by Mr. Hubbard about revenue that comes in to the City. .Mrs. Wurdrip explained the State Board of Accounts spends several days each year carefully checking this account...but these figures are not made public. It was decided this might be a good idea....since budgets only show what is spent and not

what is received in way of revenue.

PARKING METER FUND

After some discussion regarding parking motor rovonue, Mr. Hubbard made

a.motion this budget be approved in the amount of \$113,055.96. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### EVANSVILLE-VANDEREURGH LEVEE AUTHORITY DISTRICT

Discussion regarding levee budget was began when it became apparent the County budget and the City budget on the Levee were not the same figures. No action taken at this time. Discussion will resume at next meeting.

SEPTEMBER 16, 1970

Meeting called to order by Chairman, Taylor. All members present except Mr. Brune who arrived at 10:00 o'clock.

#### Review of EVANSVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY AND VANDERBURGH COUNTY LIBRARY

Mr. Edward A. Howard, Director of Evansville Public Library and Vanderburgh County Public Library and members of his staff appeared to answer questions regarding budget requests.

Mr. Taylor complimented Mr. Howard on his budget and thanked him for mailing copies to Tax Adjustment members homes. This gives the members a chance to study budget requests.

When questioned regarding increases allowed in salaries...Mr. Howard said salaries have been raised between 6 and  $T_{h}^{d}$ . He called attention to the breakdown of the salary account and how the percentage of increase was figured. Mr. Howard's salary was increased by the Library Beard in the amount of \$2000.

"In answer to Mr. Denton's question regarding Federal monies received... Mr. Howard said all money received from the Federal government was carefully earmarked for specific purposes. It was ascertained the amount of income from fines, etc. amounts to approximately \$15,000. per year. When asked concerning raises in insurance...Mr. Howard explained the increase was because of general vandalism throughout the country on public buildings. He said there was no control over these rates. When asked if federal funds could be obtained....Mr. Howard explained the only way would be to establish a regional library system.

Lr. Taylor thanked Mr. Howard and his assistants for their time and courtesy in appearing before the Bcard.

Discussion followed:

Mr. Story made a motion the Directors salary be reduced from \$17,000 to \$16,000....a reduction of \$1,000

and that

Account 112-be reduced from \$459,705 to \$450,214.80...a reduction of \$9490.20 and that

Account 113-bo reduced from \$56,724. to \$55,650....a reduction of \$1,074.

Total reduction in salary account....\$11,564.20.

Mr. Hubbard seconded motion. Motion carried.

EXPLANATION: All salaries with the exception of the Director are granted with a maximum 5% increase.

Mr. Story made a motion to reduce Account 214-Travel-from \$1000. to \$500.... a reduction of \$500. Mr. Hubbard seconded the motion. Motion carried.

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Mr. Hubbard made a motion that Account 521-Film Rontal be reduced from \$1,088 to \$885...a reduction of \$200. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion that Account 551-Pension be reduced from \$70,556 to \$69,000...a reduction of \$1556. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion that Account 552-Social Security be reduced from \$23,908. to \$23,340...reduction of \$568. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Noelting made a motion that Account #72-Library Materials be reduced from \$105,000. to \$95,000....a reduction of \$10,000. Mr. Hubbard seconded motion. Motion carried.

Total reduction in this budget.....\$24,788.20

Total amount of budget approved .... \$810,994.80

. Meeting recessed at 12:15 for lunch.

Mooting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 1:35 p.m. with all members present except Mr. Brune who arrived at 2:00 p.m.

At this time Mr. Hubbard made a motion the working balance of the Evansville Public Library and Vanderburgh County Public Library be reduced from \$175,000 to \$75,000.....a reduction of \$100,000. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

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REVIEW OF CITY BUDGET WAS RESUMED:

### COMMISSION ON HUMAN RELATIONS

Discussion regarding the position of Housing Coordinator...this salary has been paid in the past and through this year by the United Methodist Church... it is, therefore, a new position as far as the City paying this salary. Mayor MeDonald explained this was a vital position, in his opinion, and should not be deleted.

Mr. Munger of the Chamber of Commerce said the Council has considered this position along with others and since it is a new position (for the city's payroll) this is one place where economy can be instituted.

Mr. Hutbard made a motion that Account AX-11 be reduced from \$30,403. to \$23,404....a reduction of \$7000. Mr. Noelting seconded the motion. Motion carried. This action deletes salary of Housing Coordinator.

#### DEPARTMENT CF FINANCE

Discussion regarding reducing rent allottment by County Council for County's share of rent...how it was hoped revenue could be obtained from parking lot to make up the deficit. Mr. Dale Andrews was asked to appear before the Board. He was asked about the refund made to various governmental departments...he explained

money was not used and was therefore refunded.

Mr. Brune mad4 a motion that Account G-53-Rents be reduced from \$694,225. to

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\$683,225.....a roduction of \$11,000. Mr. Noelting seconded the motion. Motion carried.

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BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

Mayor McDonald explained the K-22 account in this budget. Mr. Brune made a motion budget be approved as presented in the amount of \$48,280. Mr. Story seconded the motion. Motion carried.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

AIR POLLUTION

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented in the amount of \$2,514,486.58. Mr. Denton seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as presented in the amount of \$32.774. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### RECREATION COMMISSION

Mr. Brune made a motion the U-X-11 Account-Salaries-be reduced from \$118,423.50 to \$116,423.50...a reduction of \$2000. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried. Total budget approved....\$164,163.50.

#### LIGHTING DEPARTMENT

Mr. Noelting asked the budget on lighting be reconsidered. Mayor McDonald asked that the members give consideration to a \$25,000 out in this account instead of \$50,000.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Denton made a motion previous action be recinded and Account L-22 be reduced from \$860,063 to \$835,063....a reduction of \$25,000. Mr. Brune seconded the motion. When put to a vote there were 5 "aye" votes with Mr. T ylor and Mr. Hubbard voting "nay". Motion carried.

Mayor McDonald thanked the Board for doing a good job on a good budget.

Mrs. Wardrip presented new pages on Levee Authority and explained the advertised ordinance was the one given the Board today.

Mr. Brune explained that the County Council had reduced this budget in the amount of \$1,050.

Mr. Brune then made a motion this Board concur with the County Council action and that Account M-11-Salaries & Wages be reduced from \$84,614.24 to \$84,314.24....a reduction of \$300. and that

Account M-27-Central Garage Repairs be reduced from \$1,500 to \$750...a reduction of \$750.00. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

Total amount approved....\$141,779.18.

Looting recessed at 4:00 p.m.

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#### September 17, 1970

Meeting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 9:10 a.m. All members

present except Mr. Brune who arrived at 10:30 a.m.

#### REVIEW OF BUILDING AUTHORITY BUDGET

Mr. Dale Andrews appeared before the Board to answer questions regarding this budget.

Mr. John Munger again emphasized the fact that the Chamber of Commrce supports only a 5% pay raise and this budget reflects a higher percentage than 5% in most instances.

Mr. Denton complimented Mr. Andrews on the fine manner the Civic Complex has

been maintained...all members of the Board agreed.

Regarding the refund paid to various governmental units this year, Mr. Andrews said his Board had decided to return the money the first year, but he did not know what would be done with any money if available for refund in 1971. Mr. Brune questioned Mr. Andrews about improvement being made on bridge between the Civic County Building and the Courts Building.

Mr. Munger again asked the Board to approve no more than recommended pay raise of 5% and no new personnel....that tis payroll should be viewed and put on the same status as City and County.

Mr. Andrews said he does not feel this Board has any right to cut his budget...that he is appearing before this Board upon the recommendation of his Board in order to answer any questions. He said he takes the poistion that this budget is not reviewable by the Tax Adjustment Board or the Chamber of Commerce...only the State Board of Tax Commissioners and then only if requested by the City, County or School. He said this was an independent municipal corporation set up differently from other governmental agencies.

Mr. Munger said this is a good time to find out about the power of this Board....he suggested making cuts and find out what will be done. Mr. Andrews insisted this is not following the terms of the lease as it was signed.

At this time the job evaluation question arose again and Mr. Noelting agreed this was a very necessary service...he promised he would have such an evaluation made in the city during 1971.

Mr. Brune made a motion that Account 100-Services Personal be reduced from \$499,898 to \$491,898...reduction of \$8000. Mr. Hubbard seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion that Account 200-Other Operating Expense-be approved as requested in the amount of \$247,600. Mr. Story seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion that Account 300-Additional Operating Expense be allowed in the amount of \$26,500. as requested. Mr. Story seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion, seconded by Mr. Denton that the total amount allowed be \$1,927,998. Reduction of \$28,000. Motion carried. Meeting recessed 12:00 noon

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. Meeting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 1:15 p.m. All members present except Mr. Noelting who arrived later.

Mr. Brune, as a member of the County Council explained that most raises, with very few exceptions were kept at \$200 or \$300.00.

Mr. Denton made a motion the budget of the clerk of the Circuit Court be approved as allowed by the Councy Council in the amount of \$154,690.72. Motion seconded by Mr. Brune. Motion carried.

#### COUNTY AUDITOR

Mr. Brune made a motion the budget of the County Auditor be approved as gllowed by the County Council in the amount of \$69,800. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried.

#### MECHANIZED ACCOUNTING (AUDITOR)

Mr. Brune made a motion, at the Auditor's suggestion that Account 602-Equipment-be reduced from \$2000. to \$1586.77.....a reduction of \$413.23. Mr. Story seconded motion. . Motion carried.

Total amount allowed....\$11,046.77.

#### TREASURER

Mr. Brune made a motion the budget of the County Treasurer by approved in the amount of \$122,350. as allowed by the County Council. Mr. Story seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion the Surveyor's budget be approved in the amount allowed by the County Council.....\$101,950. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried. VANDERBURGH COUNTY AUDITORIUL

Discussion regarding revenue received from Auditorium. Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as allowed by the County Council in the amount of \$103,325. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

CORONER

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be allowed in amount approved by County Council....\$28,400. Motion died for lack of second.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion that Account 104-Per Diem of Autopsy be reduced from \$6000. to \$4000.....a reduction of \$2000. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried.

Total budget approved....\$26,400.

#### COUNTY ASSESSOR

. Mr. Brune made a motion County Assessor's budget be approved in the amount allowed by County Council of \$44,575. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried. CENTER TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Mr. Brune explained salaries in this budget were raised in accordance with those allowed in other townships.

Mr. Brune made a motion budget be approved as allowed by County Council in the amount of \$30,590. Mr. Denton seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion that budget of Knight Township Assessor be approved as allowed by County Council in the amount of \$36,600. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Brune made a motion the budget of the Perry Township Assessor be approved. as allowed by the County Council in the amount of \$15,450. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried. . . .

#### PIGEON TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR

Mr. Hubbard made a motion Account 201D-Transportation be reduced from \$500 to \$300....a reduction of \$200

and that

Account 211-Office Supplies be reduced from \$2800 to \$2500....a

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reduction of \$300. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

Total reduction in the budget .... \$500.

Total amount allowed.....\$43,300.

MEETING RECESSED at 4:00 p.m.

#### September 18, 1970

Meeting called to order at 9:15 a.m. by Chairman Taylor, All members present. TALK BY MR. BAILEY MERRILL

Mr. Merrill appeared before the Board and spoke on the need for a full time prosecutor and for the need of allowing the salary approved by the County Council in the amount of \$22,500. He said a full time prosecutor would have no outside practice of any kind. When questioned regarding the law on a full time prosecutor, Mr. Merrill admitted that there is no law at the present time but that the Bar Association will introduce a bill in the State legislature asking for such a law....both candidates for this office have pledged to be a full time prosecutor and he believed each of these men to be trustworthy....they would be morally obligated to live up to their pledge.

Mr. Brune asked Mr. Merill to comment on the way the County Council allowed the amount of \$40,000 for deputies to be spent as the elected prosecutor feels is best. Mr. Merrill said the man elected would be under close scrutiny and he was sure either candidate would use this money to the best advantage. Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Merrill for his comments.

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#### DISCUSSION

Mr. Munger reported the Chamber of Commerce approved a full time prosecutor and wishes there could be a full time staff....that this is a step in the right direction. He also said there should be a law creating a full time prosecutor...but in any event the Chamber of Commerce approved the County Council's action in all aspects of this budget.

Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Munger.

Mr. Groves, one of the candidates for the office of Prosecutor, thanked the Board for the privilege of appearing before them. He gave a resume of the budget he had submitted as a candidate as follows: Salary, Prosecutor.....\$22,500. First Deputy....\$15,000--Three full time deputies at \$12,000 each--Investigator--\$9,000, Support Investigator--\$6,000, Three secretaries at \$5,200 each. The only other change he suggested was for \$3000 in equipment account for dictaphones, etc. He emphasized he would be a full time Prosecutor without any outside practice.

Mr. Hubbard said each of these candidates should be complimented on their courage in running for this office.

Mr. Robert Hayes, the present Prosecutor, appeared before the Board to

report the budget he submitted was approved by the Bar Association. He said the law now provides for a part time Prosecutor...but that a law would be introduced in the legislatuse asking that this office be made into a full time position. When asked if he thought the budget approved by the County Council was sufficient, Mr. Hayes said he thought it was going to be necessary to have another investigator to do the job right. The Council had deleted the position of one investigator.

Mrs. Mooney a County Councilman appeared before the Board and noted it was

unusual for a member of the County Council to appear before this board. She said she

had been assi ned to investigate the prosocutor's office and the budget requests as a member of the Gouncil. Mrs. Mooney said she was heartily in favor of the amount of \$40,000 being allowed for hiring of deputies at the pleasure of the Prosecutor. She said she was certainly in favor of having full time deputies if they could be hired for the amount of money allowed and they would be competent employees. She also predicted another investigator would be needed and that she approved money being left in the equipment account for sorely needed equipment for use by personnel in this office. Mr. Taylor thanked Mrs. Mooney for her interest and for taking the time to appear before this Board.

Mr. William Brune, the other candidate for Prosecutor asked to speak and said he was in favor of the proposed budget but was in favor of the Prosecutor's salary being at \$25,000., which the Ear Association had approved. He said he too would be a full time Prosecutor without any outside practice. He said that Mr. Merrill had said that he was not in favor of a full time staff....this was not true...he had never made such a statement, but he did believe he would be unable to get anyone to give up a full time law practice to be a deputy for \$12,000. If he could get qualified men for this amount, Mr. Brune said he would be happy to do so. He repeated he wanted qualified men for these positions but, if elected, he would do the best he could with the allotted amount of money.

Mr. Hayes said he thought giving the lump sum of \$40,000. to be spent on deputies was a good idea....he wished he had been as fortunate to have this while he was in office. He advised the Board it was very necessary to have qualified attorneys since they had to appear in Circuit, Superior, Juvenile and City Courts. In answer to a law being passed regarding the full time prosecutor, Mr. Hayes suggested there could be one passed especially for Evansville.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion the Prosecutor's budget be allowed in the amount approved by the County Council of \$90,950. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried. Mr. Brune "abstained".

#### CIRCUIT COURT

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved in the amount allowed by the County Council.....\$133,520. Mr. Noelting seconded motion. Motion carried. <u>SUPERIOR COURT</u>

Mrs. Mooney had reported briefly on this budget...since this was one of her assignments from the Council. She explained her opinion on this budget and the Council's actions.

John Munger suggested an additional person had been added under 102C and

could be eliminated.

Mr. Brune said that this is a position that is badly needed. He made a motion the Superior Court budget be allowed as approved by the County Council in the amount of \$155,600. Mr. Denton seconded the motion. When put to a vote, there were 5 "aye" votes, Mr. Hubbard voted "nay" and Mr. Taylor abstained. Motion carried.

#### JUVENILE COURT-PROBATE

Mr. Rice Kello was asked to appear before the Board to answer questions regarding Account 401-Educational Adj. Center.

Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Kello for his explanation and for his courtesy in appearing before the Board.

Mr. Noelting made a motion that Account 401-Educational Adj. Center be reduced from \$4000 to \$2000....a reduction of \$2000. Mr. Story seconded motion. Notion carried.

Total amount allowed in budget.....\$112,025.

Meeting recessed at 12:00 noon.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Taylor at 1:15 p.m. All members were present except Mr. Brune who arrived at 2:00 p.m.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF COUNTY BUILDINGS

Mr. Herman Hotz, County Superintendent of Buildings was asked to appear before the Board to explain his budget. After considerable discussion, John Munger spoke regarding Account 103-Extra Help.

Mr. Brune made a motion budget be allowed in the amount of \$40,600 as approved by the County Council. Motion died for lack of second.

Commissioner, A. J. Stofleth, spoke to the Board and answered questions regarding it.

Mr. Brune amended his motion that Account 103-Extra Help, be reduced from \$4,000 to \$3,500....a reduction of \$500.

and that

Account 205-Repairs to Equipment be reduced from \$3,300 to \$2,800....a reduction of \$500.

Mr. Hubbard seconded motion. Motion carried.

Total reduction.....\$1,000 Total amount allowed....\$39,600.

Mr. Brune made a motion this budget be approved as allowed by the County Council in the amount of \$121,815. Motion died for lack of a second.

Mr. Jack Harness was asked to appear before the Board to answer some questions. He told the members of this Board that at the present time he has 45 residents and that his projected income for the year would be \$120,000.

Mr. Harness asked Mr. Taylor if the Tax Adjustment Board has the authority

to raise any budget....that he was not happy with the raise given him and that his wife was not allowed any raise. Mr. Taylor told Mr. Harness the Tax Adjustment Board can only affect outs in budgets.

A review of the County Commissioners budget was started with Mr. Stofleth, County Commissioner, answering various questions from members of the Board...since it was past 4:00 p.m. it was decided to continue the review of this budget on Monday.

Meeting called to order by Chairman, Taylor, with all members present except Mr. Noelting who arrived at 10:40 a.m.

Mr. Walter Riggs, Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Business introduced Dr. Wilmer K. Bugher, new Superintendent of Schools, to members of the Board.

Dr. Bugher passed out prepared charts showing the comparison of seven large school corporations in Indiana. He explained during the work shop held regarding budget, considerable cuts were made by the School Board members in order to comply with the \$4.95 tax rate limit. He also explained two special programs... "inner city" and T.V. educational program.

Mr. Taylor thanked Dr. Bugher for his explanation.

It was expalined the "inner city" was an experiment and that one school will be chosen from the 12 possible target schools for this new program. This program would be supported entirely by Vanderburgh County.

explained the reason for each request...also explained the need for additional personnel.

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## SEPTEMBER 23, 1970

Mr. John Munger, speaking as a professional T.V. personality suggested it might be possible for the T.V. teacher to present a second class...thus cutting the teachers from 8 to 4 for this work.

Meeting recessed at 12:00 o'clock.

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Meeting called to order at 1:40 p.m. by Chairman Taylor. Mr. Noelting, Mr. Nicholson and Mr. Brune were absent. Mr. Noelting arrived at 2:45 p.m. SPECIAL DELEGATION

A delegation of approximately 75 persons appeared before the Board protesting the deleting of Housing Coordinator's salary in the amount of \$7000.00 from Human Relations Budget.

Mr. Martin Leich, representing Human Relations Board presented a request from this Board that this position be reinstated. He read a prepared statement that explained in detail the necessity of a housing coordinator. The United Methodist Church previously paid this salary and will continue for the rest of this year...it thm becomes the responsibility of the Human Relations budget. Mr. Leich explained the gentleman now serving as coordinator, Mr. Robert Sachs, will be unable to continue in this position next year. He introduced Mr. Sachs who spoke briefly telling of some personal experiences in relation to this job.

Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Leich and Mr. Sachs and all persons attending this meeting for their interest and time.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion, seconded by Mr. Denton that the amount requested in Township Fund of \$58,764.00 be approved. Motion carried.

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#### SPECIAL REQUEST

At this time, Mr. Jerry Baugh asked for permission to address the Board. Permission granted.

Mr. Baugh, a member of the Law Library Committee of the Bar Association asked members of the Tax Adjustment Board to reconsider the \$1000 reduction made in the County Commissioners budget under Account 408-B-Law Books.

He said a minimum of \$5,000 must be allowed in order to maintain the library at its present status. The recommendation made by this committee was for \$8,000, which was reduced to \$5000. Mr. Baugh expalined how this library is used by all five courts, the prosecuting attorney, lawyers, students and many other organizations throughout the city. He explained the cost of books has also risen considerably.

. Mr. Taylor thanked Mr. Baugh for his presentation.

Mr. Jack Chaddock, Knight Township Trustee appeared to explain his budget. Mr. Taylor complimented Mr. Chaddock on his presentation.

Mr. Hubbard made a motion budget be approved as presented. Mr. Story seconded motion. Motion carried.

Township fund...alowed in the amount of \$23,732.

Poor Relief Fund...allowed in the amount of \$49,300.

Meeting recessed at 4:00 p.m.

#### SEPTEMBER 24, 1970

Chairman Taylor called meeting to order at 9:10 a.m. All members present except Mr. Brune and Mr. Noelting who arrived later.

#### REVIEW OF SCHOOL BUDGET CONTINUED

Dr. Bugher, School Superintendent, reminded the Board any reduction made in school budget may cause trouble in staffing of new schools. He requested any

cuts made not be done on line by line basis.

Mr. Joe Mills, Supervisor of "Head Start" program asked to speak regarding the Board's apparent decision to disallow the "inner city program" and wants to know on what basis it was being eliminated. He said this is an especially carefully worked out program and simply because it is a new program...was no reason to cut it

out. Why is this considered an expendable item?

Mr. Hubbard reminded Mr. Mills that this Board is trying to hold the line on taxes...expecially in the interest of older citizens living on fixed incomes.

Mr. John Roberts, President of the Evansville Teacher's Association, spoke in support of Mr. Mills argument with regard to the "inner city" program.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Charles E. Taylor, Sr. with all members present.

Members were presented copies of minutes prepared by Auditor's secretary to be studied.

Chairman Taylor read a resolution passed by the Tax A justment Board in 1968. He explained that some members on the Board this year were not present when this resolution was passed.

Mr. Hubbard said it looks as if passing a resolution doesn't accomplish much.. only takes up room in the minutes. He is in favor of passing a resolution regarding several problem areas discussed by this Board. The thing that concerns him, he said, is the criticism received by members of the Tax Adjustment Board on some of the action taken at this year's meeting. It seems that people are not interested in the rise in taxes.

Mr. Denton said the real problem is the present tax structure....which should be changed. More consideration should be shown property owners and he suggested relief could be given by an increase in sales and income taxes.

Mr. Noelting said as he sees it the two major problems are the need of a change in the tax structure and inflation. Management in government and industry are trying to hold the line as much as possible.

Mr. Nicholson suggested a copy of the resolution be sent to legislative candidates, they are the ones who can do something about bringing a change in tax structure.

Mr. Munger of the Chamber of Commerce assured the members the Chamber of Commerce would have representatives at the state legislature.

The editorial which appeared in Monday's Press was discussed.

Chairman Taylor urged members, when the State Tax Board holds hearings for

appeals, if at all possible, to be present.

It was decided a resolution would be prepared to be engrossed in the minutes

of this Board.

Members approved and signed minutes.

Meeting adjourned at 11:00 a.m. until called.

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of Indiana limit the total of all tax rates on property within any municipal corporation for all municipal corporations which the property therein is taxable, except in certain instances to One Dollar and Twenty Five (\$1.25) Cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property therein, in territories outside of the corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Toxns, and limits the rate of Two Dollars (\$2.00) on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in territories inside corporate limits of incorporated Cities and Toxns; and

WHEREAS, said Board has endeavored to limit the aggregate of the tax rates in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the State of Indiana, and

NOW, pursuant to, and in conformity with said laws, we do hereby revise, change and reduce said budgets and fix and determine the tax levies of the follwoing municipal corporations of Vanderburgh County, in the State of Indiana, as follows:

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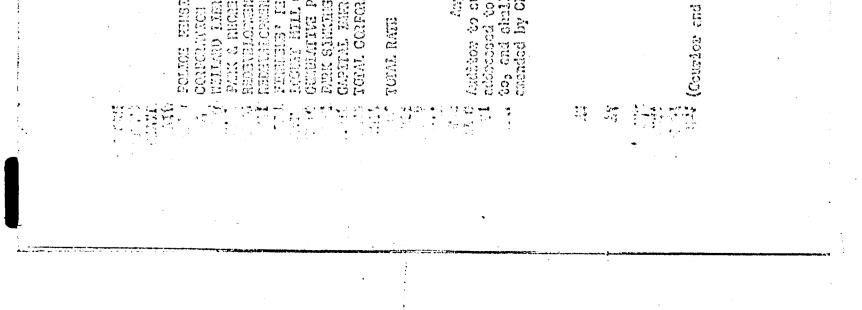

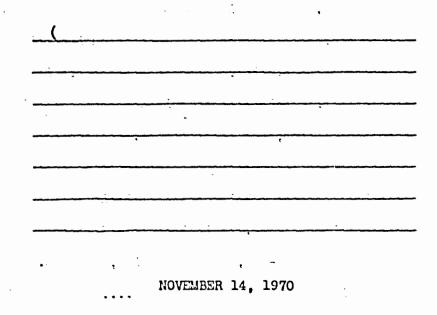

#### COUNTY CORONER

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Chief Deputy Coroner, Earl Cox. He explained that he has some money left in the 8-104, Per Diem of Autopsy, account that he won't be needing this year and would like to transfer it to the 8-213A, Film, Colored and 8-213B, Film Processing, accounts. Mr. Lensing asked Mr. Cox if he takes pictures of all accidents where death occurs. Mr. Cox answered "yes, that is the law".

#### PERRY TOXINSHIP ASSESSOR

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Ben Bockstege, Perry Township Assessor. This is a transfer of funds from the postage and transportation accounts to 9E-103, Extra deputies, account. He explained he needs the extra deputies due to the reassessment....needs them in preparing the field sheets.

#### DEPARTMENT OF WELFARE

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Dale Work. He said they will need \$36,000.00 to carry them through the rest of the year in the 403H A.D.C. Custody of relatives, account. He explained that as of November 1, 1970 they had 1,075 cases, with 32 pending, that is 2,837 children.

When questioned by Mr. Lensing if the number of cases can be limited, Mr. Work said they can not limit them as they are required by law to take care of them and must exceed the amount budgeted if necessary.

Mr. Lensing said he is interested in the children and every one concerned but wonders what is going to happen to the tax rate if this keeps on growing.

Mr. Work said they would get almost 82% back from the Federal Government of this \$36,000.00 he is asking for. Mr. Lensing asked what percentage of these children are wards of the court. Mr. Work said a very low percentage. Mr. Lensing asked if they reinvestigate these cases periodically? Mr. Work said "yes, in many of the cases they are investigated on a weekly basis". Mr. Lensing asked if he would be willing to try with the A.D.C. program to keep track of all the cases. Mr. Work said "no, because he does not have the time". He said

he has only a staff large enough now to carry about one third of the work load. Mr. Kinney said he thought it would be helpful if Mr. Work would give each of the

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council members copies of the work sheets to describe each program. Mr. Work explained account 405, insurance & premiums, as being needed for workman's compensation.

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Mr. Tom Jones was present from Evansville Amociation for Retarded Children. Mr. Lutz asked him if he had anything to say. Mr. Jones said the reason for his being there is to be sure the bond issue is signed so they can break ground in the Spring.

#### SHERIFF

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Sheriff, Jerry Riney. The need for extra money for account 5-104, Longevity, is because an error was made when longevity pay was figured, therefore, needs more funds in this account. Sheriff Riney said he had applied to the Indiana Criminal Justice Planning Agency for funds for different types of equipment for his department. This equipment will be paid for 25% by the County Government and 75% by the Federal Government.... needs application signed by the President of the Council that it is all right for him to make this application and that the money is in the budget.. Cost to the County will be \$1,093.70 and cost to Federal Government will be \$3,281.10. There is \$2,000.C0 budgeted for this account.

Sheriff Riney also had application for Indiana Criminal Justice Planning Agency for\_equipment for three new automobiles. Wanted Council's approval to buy three new automobiles for approximately \$10,500.00 and the agency would equip these cars with radio equipment, etc., at a cost of \$3,360.00

Sheriff Riney said his department covers 650 road miles with three automobiles now. Commissioner Buthod said the Commissioners have received numerous requests for additional patrolling of county roads and the Commissioners would recommend the most serious consideration of the Sheriff's request.

Mr. Lensing said he could not commit himself at this time.

Mrs. Mooney said she would like to point out to the new members that the Sheriff's department had an excellent record and she would like for the Council to give the request serious consideration.

# Mr. Aarstad said he would like to support Mrs. Mooney's request that this be reviewed.

#### CLERK

This need for additional appropriations was explained by Joseph O'Day.

Account 1-603, Xerox Leasing, is increased because of the increased cost of Xerox.... went to faster machine because it was necessary.

Mrs. Mooney asked if the \$2,500.00 budgeted for next year would take care of it.

He said "yes" unless it would take more for the paper.

Mr. O'Day said this is the only County in the State of Indiana that has all the records in one building from the beginning of the County, which goes back to 1818.

This need for additional appropriations was also explained by Mr. O'Day....have no control over these accounts.

John Munger asked about funds that were left in the Boehne Convalescent account whon they closed.

Mr. Volpe, County Auditor, said that, with permission from Council, funds originally earmarked fro Boehne have been used to meet other expenses in the county. If the funds had not been taken from the Boehne account they would have had to come from the county general fund.....it was simply a matter of deciding from which pocket to take the money, he explained.

Mrs. Mooney asked Mr. Buthod what has been done with the Furniture and equipment that was at Boehne. Mr. Buthod replied "nothing". The dictating machine is in the commissioner's office.....have given some of the desks to the CAPE program.

#### SUPERIOR COURT

This need for additional funds was explained by Judge Dietsch....these are noncontrollable accounts.....12-107, per diem of Jurors and 12-405, Ledging & Meals for Jurors.

#### AUDITOR

This need for additional funds was explained by County Auditor, Lewis F. Volpe. Account 2A-602, equipment, is for filing cabinets for car registrations....he must keep a copy of registration in his office for three years and for two years downstairs. <u>COUNTY COMMISSIONERS</u>

This need for additional funds was explained by Commissioner Buthod. Account 19-105A, Office Supplies, is needed to prepare briefs to be taken to Shelbyville to try to get the inheritance tax refund which would amount to over \$1,000,000. Account 19-408B, Law Library books, is for bills that have been incurred.

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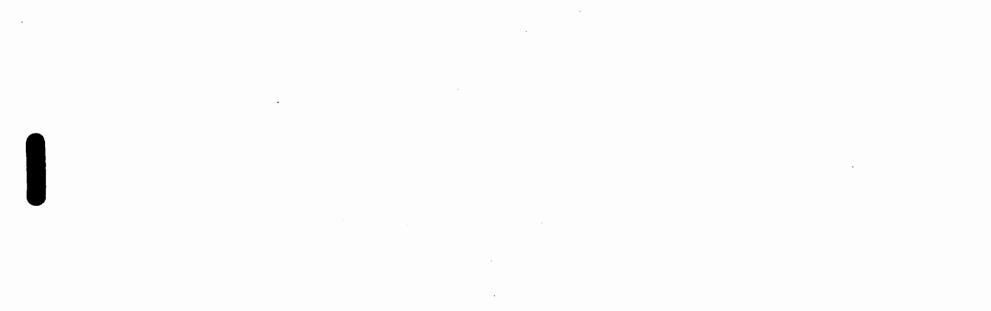
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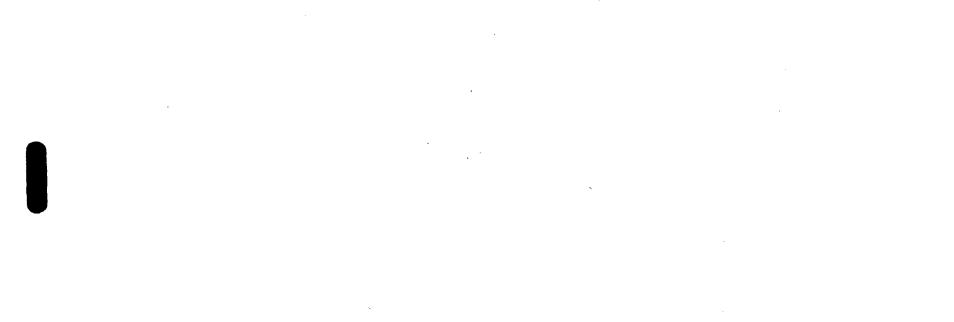
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
