

**VANDERBURGH COUNTY
BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
MARCH 27, 2018**

The Vanderburgh County Board of Commissioners met in session this 27th day of March, 2018 at 3:00 p.m. in Room 301 of the Civic Center Complex with President Bruce Ungethiem Presiding.

Call to Order

President Ungethiem: Good afternoon. I would like to welcome you to the Vanderburgh County Board of Commissioners March 27th meeting.

Attendance Roll Call

President Ungethiem: The first order of business is attendance. Could you please call roll, Madelyn?

Madelyn Grayson: Commissioner Shoulders?

Commissioner Shoulders: Here.

Madelyn Grayson: Commissioner Musgrave?

Commissioner Musgrave: Here.

Madelyn Grayson: President Ungethiem?

President Ungethiem: Here. Having three members present, we do have a quorum.

Pledge of Allegiance

President Ungethiem: Would you please stand and join Kristin, who will lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

(The Pledge of Allegiance was given.)

President Ungethiem: Thank you.

Commissioner Comments

President Ungethiem: The reason I asked Kristin to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance, is her alma mater went to the State Championship game this past weekend. Unfortunately, it didn't turn out as we had hoped, but we do want to congratulate Bosse High School for making it to the final game of the Championship of the 3A basketball. I believe, floating around somewhere on Facebook, is a picture of Kristin in her cheerleading outfit back when she was at Bosse High School. So, we want to congratulate all of the people, Coach Burkhardt, and all of the people at Bosse for a fine year, and for getting to the State Championship game. Commissioner Shoulders: Absolutely.

President Ungethiem: Alright, nobody's in class this afternoon, they're all here with us.

Commissioner Musgrave: Okay.

Commissioner Shoulders: We have two more.

President Ungethiem: And we have two more gentlemen over here.

Commissioner Shoulders: Push the light there. See it?

Keandre Saunders: This one?

Commissioner Shoulders: Yeah.

Keandre Saunders: My name is Keandre Saunders. I'm from Central High School.

Commissioner Musgrave: Welcome.

President Ungethiem: Yeah!

Commissioner Shoulders: Welcome.

Trey Whipple: My name is Trey Whipple. I'm from Harrison.

Commissioner Shoulders: Go Warriors.

Additional Commissioner Comments

President Ungethiem: Welcome all, and, I guess, congratulations to the University of Evansville for getting a new head basketball coach, who is a former Harrison High School product, I believe.

Commissioner Shoulders: A friend of mine, a former Harrison Alum, Walter McCarty. Welcome back to our community, Walter, and I know you'll do a great job. So, we're glad to have you back.

President Ungethiem: Okay. One other item, for those of you who haven't seen, we have Bicentennial t-shirts that are going on sale when?

Commissioner Musgrave: Immediately.

President Ungethiem: Immediately. So, if you're interested in getting a Bicentennial t-shirt, we don't have, nobody has one on, but if you're interested in getting a Bicentennial t-shirt, contact our office, and I believe for the public it's ten dollars for a Bicentennial t-

shirt. Let us know that, we've sold several hundred already, I believe. So, that's going well as well.

Permission to Open Bids: VC18-02-01:St. Joseph Avenue Bridge #1921

President Ungethiem: The next item on the agenda is permission to open bids for VC18-02-01, which are the bids for the St. Joseph Avenue Bridge, and I would entertain a motion to open the bids.

Commissioner Musgrave: So moved.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second the motion.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second to open bids. Any further discussion? All of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

President Ungethiem: Joe will be opening those up, and we'll get back to those when John comes up, I suspect.

Permission to Seek Quotes for 2018 County Tax Default Property Auction

President Ungethiem: Okay, under action items, the first item is permission to seek quotes for the 2018 County Tax Default Property Auction. I would entertain a motion for permission to seek quotes.

Commissioner Musgrave: I'll move approval, and, Kristin, correct me, or make additions to my comments here as necessary, but this is in order to auction the properties that failed to sell at two successive Tax Sales, and the County Commission will be taking deeds, taking title to these properties. So, we're looking for auction companies to answer, to do a request, answer our request for proposal, where we may hire one or more auction companies, in order to dispose of these properties. We'll be looking for their ideas, and going from there. Alright, anything else to add?

Kristin Comer: No, that covers it.

Commissioner Musgrave: Okay.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second the motion. Thanks for clarifying.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Anything to add, Kristin?

Kristin Comer: No.

President Ungethiem: Okay. All of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

Discussion of HSA Opportunity for Vanderburgh County Employees

President Ungethiem: The second action item is a discussion of HSA opportunity. Unfortunately, Tony Flittner is unable to be with us this afternoon. He called and was unable to attend. So, what we decided to do was to table this until he can be here.

Commissioner Shoulders: Well, Bob was here, but I didn't see—

Commissioner Musgrave: Right, well, it's not that he couldn't attend. He's seeking clarification of the quote that was given to him by Anthem.

Commissioner Shoulders: Through them, yeah.

Commissioner Musgrave: Whether that was—

Commissioner Shoulders: Yeah.

Commissioner Musgrave: -- effective all the way through July 1st, which is when we're—

Commissioner Shoulders: Or April.

Commissioner Musgrave: --thinking of allowing an option to current, to county employees to switch—

Commissioner Shoulders: Yeah.

Commissioner Musgrave: --from the current insurance to a Health Savings Account. He had gotten a bid for that, and he noticed that the dates on the numbers was not what he had requested.

President Ungethiem: Were not correct.

Commissioner Shoulders: Yeah.

Commissioner Musgrave: So, he did not want to bring those numbers forward, without being certain that those were the right numbers. But, the option to move to an HSA is a very attractive one, and it could make a heck of a difference on our insurance bottom line. So, I'm really looking forward to this presentation in a week or so.

President Ungethiem: Okay. We have the time, so we elected just to move that back to the next meeting to make sure we had the right numbers, and everything was in order there. That will be on April the 3rd.

Board Appointments

President Ungethiem: Moving on, board appointments, we have one board appointment to the MBE/WBE Utilization Board, and that's Abram Brown.

Commissioner Shoulders: Abraham.

Commissioner Musgrave: Abraham?

Commissioner Shoulders: Yeah.

President Ungethiem: I would entertain a motion to approve.

Commissioner Musgrave: Motion to approve Abraham Brown.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second the motion for Abraham.

President Ungethiem: A motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

County Engineer

President Ungethiem: Alright, we'll move into department head reports. First up, John?

John Stoll: First I have two Notice of Intent letters for IDEM for two county projects. The first one is for the Green River Road reconstruction between Kansas Road and Boonville-New Harmony Road. This just has to be submitted to IDEM in advance of any land disturbance. So, I need your approval on that, and we'll get it sent.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? All of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

John Stoll: The other Notice of Intent is for the University Parkway sewer project. I need your approval on that as well.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

John Stoll: Next I've got a Notice to Bidders for the resurfacing of Baumgart Road, between State Road 57 and Mt. Pleasant Road. This is contract number VC18-04-02. This will be milling and resurfacing of that section of road.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: Second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

President Ungethiem: John, on these notice to bidders, in the past few bidding processes we have not had an overabundance of quotes come in. Is it something that we could, not only give a notice to the bidder, but have a follow up phone call to—

John Stoll: I could contact the other contractors. We've been getting bids from the two in town contractors, who usually bid. Once we get out of town contractors, I don't know if it's very feasible for them to bid county projects. It probably depends on the distance to their, from their plant to the site and things like that.

President Ungethiem: Okay.

John Stoll: But, I can contact people. I also had called and emailed some contractors on the bridge project we're opening bids on right now, just to try and make sure everybody's aware of it. So, it's not a problem to try to get a hold of people.

President Ungethiem: Yeah, just give them a little extra nudge, maybe that will get them to submit a bid.

John Stoll: Okay.

President Ungethiem: Okay. Go ahead.

John Stoll: Next I've got a supplemental agreement with the Lochmueller Group. This is on the Green River Road mitigation site. This is an increase of \$33,895. We've never received the release from the Corps of Engineers on the mitigation site, due to the survival rates of the trees. So, this contract calls for planting additional trees out there on that mitigation site, and then also removal of some invasive species that the Corps of Engineers does not like out there. Once we get this replanted, then there will be another monitoring period, and we have to do the annual reports to the Corps. So, hopefully this will get this resolved and we can finally get a release.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second the motion.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

John Stoll: Next I've got another administrative settlement on parcel 18 on the Green River Road project, phase VI. This is for an increase of \$1,313.22, which will make the final offer amount on the property \$42,293.22.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

John Stoll: Then, last I've got a supplemental agreement with the Lochmueller Group for \$5,000 for the Maryland Street Bridge. This just covers their ongoing work associated with that project.

Commissioner Musgrave: Move approval.

Commissioner Shoulders: Second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

John Stoll: That's all I have.

Commissioner Shoulders: Thanks, John.

President Ungethiem: Before you go, are you ready?

Joe Harrison, Jr.: I am ready.

President Ungethiem: Alright. Joe's going to tell us what the bids are.

Joe Harrison, Jr.: St. Joe Avenue Bridge replacement, what is that, bridge number 1921. Four bids came in, the first is from Weddle Brothers, the bid amount \$830,445.45. That's eight three oh four four five four five. The next bid was from Deig Brothers, the bid amount \$821,830.45. Eight twenty one eight thirty forty five. The third bid, from Blankenberger Brothers, that bid amount is \$746,500. Seven forty six five hundred. The final bid from Ragle, Inc., bid amount \$825,073, and it looks like I wrote down thirty cents, but it may be thirty two cents. Let me look just a second. My penmanship's not as good as it used to be. Let's see here. Thirty cents, eight twenty five zero seventy three thirty. So, those are the four bids, and I would ask that they be taken under advisement, reviewed, and Mr. Stoll can come back at the next meeting, I guess next Tuesday.

Commissioner Musgrave: So moved.

President Ungethiem: Do we need a motion?

Joe Harrison, Jr.: Yes, we need a motion to that effect.

Commissioner Musgrave: I did.

Commissioner Shoulders: She just did. Second.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion, we need a second.

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second the motion.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second to take these bids under advisement. All of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

President Ungethiem: Okay, moving on to new...or, are there any other department heads before we go further? I didn't see any others, but I just wanted to make sure.

New Business

President Ungethiem: Moving on to new business. The first item is there's going to be a series of meetings on the I-69 Bridge, and they'll be putting out a flyer. These are public meetings that anybody can attend to get more information on the options that they have for the bridge. There is a copy of this up on our bulletin board out in the hallway, and they'll be putting these out, I think they'll be putting them in the paper, as well as various other places. But, the meetings are Tuesday, April 3rd; Wednesday, April the 11th; Tuesday, April the 17th; Wednesday, April the 18th; Monday, April the 30th; and Tuesday, May the 1st. So, if you're interested in I-69 and the I-69 Bridge project, you'll have an opportunity within the next month or so to go to these meetings, get the information and ask any questions that you might have.

Commissioner Musgrave: I just want to add to that, I've gone to a couple of those meetings, and there is the potential, under one of the scenarios that they were presenting, that Waterworks Road could be affected. One of the scenarios that they had, it's not a likely one, but no decision has been made, and things are fluid, showed them eliminating the access to Waterworks Road from 41. When I asked, you know, how would people access the east side, the roads that go down into the bottoms over there on Weinbach, and they suggested that folks would be turning right into Ellis Park, and then going down that ramp. They claimed that that was a public road. Well, I'm not so sure it's a public road, but even if it is a public road, golly, that seems odd. So, you know, that's just one of the things that was brought to my attention by going to one of these meetings. I think it's important that the public go and learn. Another aspect is, they are talking about removing one of the bridges that currently serves U.S. 41. So, there are two bridges that go across to Henderson right now. They're talking about removing one, and perhaps keeping the other, or removing them both and putting a new one there. So, there, again, this is a fluid situation. Well, I assert that if they do anything, they need to have a trail on the side of the bridge. That there needs to be pedestrian and bicycle access to be able to cross that bridge. While those have not been important modes of transportation up till now, going forward, for the next hundred years that that bridge is going to be there, there's more emphasis on that. Then, secondly, and perhaps more importantly, they're talking about tolling both bridges, the new I-69 bridge and the remaining 41 bridge. So, there would be no way to get across the river for free. Now, you hear all kinds of stuff, that the Governor has said, oh, no, there's no way that he would ever allow that bridge to be tolled. Well, shoot, who knows when they're going to be building that bridge. In any event, I think that it ought to accommodate people walking or biking across, particularly since we are busy now, the city is busy building the trail along U.S. 41 through town. It makes sense that you would be able to actually cross the river too on a trail. I think that that's a letter that we need to write as a Commission, and submit, because when I brought it up at a Chamber meeting where an official was there from the I-69, he basically thought I was absolutely out of mind. That nobody had ever brought up the need to cross the river on foot or anything, and that that wasn't needed. Well, I think it is. I think the south side of Evansville needs to be served in every possible way. So, I might take a stab at writing a letter, or maybe I'll make some notes and make Joe write the letter and have that brought forward to a future meeting, but those are just two of the things about the new I-69 Bridge. Something that we need, we needed it five years ago, we really need it, there's not enough money for it, to pay for it so it would be a free bridge, and they're investigating every single scenario for funding that bridge, and we ought to make sure that we get a bridge that will serve the community for the next hundred years.

President Ungethiem: Okay, any other comments? You have an opportunity to give your input. Attend one of these meetings and let them know what you think. Commissioner Musgrave is correct, I was at an MPO meeting where they gave a presentation about this, and they are seriously considering tolling, not only the new I-69 Bridge, but any old Highway 41 Bridge that may remain, as part of these functions. So, in the event that you

live in Vanderburgh County and work in Henderson, or vice versa, that would be very important to you on a daily basis, is that toll you would have to pay to get to and from your place of work. So, please attend those meetings. Any other new business?

Commissioner Musgrave: Do you want to talk about the State of Disaster Recovery and our efforts with FEMA?

President Ungethiem: I don't know that I've got a lot of information on that at this point in time. But, we can, you know, we can talk about what we know at this point in time.

Commissioner Musgrave: Or, maybe we could ask Mr. Weaver to come to our next meeting and have him update us?

President Ungethiem: That might be a better way, because he's going to have more information about where we are with that. We're attempting at this point in time, the Emergency Management Association for Vanderburgh County and the City of Evansville, is accumulating information right now about how much damage was caused because of the flooding in the last several weeks. Unfortunately, that may not be over. So, until we get a full picture of how much damage has occurred and how much money it's going to take to recover, we don't have a full picture of that, but Mr. Weaver is accumulating that information across the county, and it might be good to ask him to come to the next meeting and give us a report. The reason I say it may not be over, is this is the projected river level for the next weekend. We will wind up, assuming we don't have anymore rain than they anticipate, we're going to wind up about 38.6 feet, with a flood stage of 42. If it gets above 40 it goes across Union Township again, it goes across the roads down in Union Township. We have already started to close roads again because of the river levels. So, be very aware of that, the river is coming back up. If we get a lot of rain in the next few days, over the weekend, that river may wind up getting back above flood stage. So, be very aware of that, as you go forward into next week or so.

Old Business

President Ungethiem: Any old business? Seeing none.

Public Comment

President Ungethiem: Any public comment? No? Okay.

Consent Items

Commissioner Musgrave: (Inaudible. Microphone not on.)

President Ungethiem: Alright, consent items.

Commissioner Musgrave: Is there anyone here from the County Assessor's Office to speak to the two requests for appraisal? Could you explain why these are needed?

Bill Fluty: Yes, Bill Fluty, County Assessor. The one is for an IBTR hearing, and the others are just, we've done this randomly in the past to identify select properties throughout the county that, to actually have appraisals. They may be a little more difficult. We may not use, I think I said up to 20. Sometimes we do four or five, sometimes we do a little bit more. But, I put it at 20 just in case that's the number we get to, but, they actually, if we're in a dispute with a property owner, an appraisal is the best way to prove value. So, we use it for that, we may use it for some other standards. So, it's just coming into that season, so, we're there. We're at the lowest appeals that we've ever been. We're current in our appeals. We're actually working on this year's appeals. So, we have less than 800 appeals on the books. With some good luck, and it's an historic low number for Vanderburgh County. So, we're in pretty good shape. So, with, now IBTR, that's a different story, that's actually a hearing when we haven't been able to come to agreement with a....these are mostly, mostly IBTR's are commercial, they don't always have to be, but no agreement's been reached, so then it's basically part of a, evidence, providing

evidence at the hearing. So, an appraisal is evidence, along with other, there will be other evidence provided. So, that is what those two are for.

President Ungethiem: Okay. Any other questions?

Commissioner Musgrave: On, not on that, but I would like to exempt out item D from my motion to approve the consent agenda.

Bill Fluty: Are you finished with me?

President Ungethiem: Item D, not A (d), but item D itself?

Commissioner Musgrave: County Auditor, February 2018 Accounts Payable Voucher, item D.

Commissioner Shoulders: Capital D, not small d?

Commissioner Musgrave: Yeah, sorry.

President Ungethiem: Okay, I was looking at the other d.

Commissioner Shoulders: So, was I.

President Ungethiem: A sub d, instead of—

Commissioner Musgrave: I'll put my glasses on.

President Ungethiem: I was looking at little d, not big D.

Commissioner Shoulders: I was too, yeah.

Bill Fluty: Are you finished with me?

Commissioner Musgrave: I am.

Bill Fluty: Okay, thank you.

Commissioner Shoulders: Thanks, Bill.

Commissioner Musgrave: So, I move approval of everything except item D, County Auditor.

President Ungethiem: We have a motion to approve all consent items, except item D, County Auditor. Do we have a second?

Commissioner Shoulders: I'll second the motion.

President Ungethiem: We have a second. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: The motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

President Ungethiem: Now, we want to identify item D separately here?

Commissioner Musgrave: I do. I would like to table that. If you'll recall, Commissioner Shoulders was not available for our discussion at our last meeting, and I think that a little bit more research needs to be done before we can move forward with it. So, I would like to table County Auditor, February 2018 Accounts Payable.

President Ungethiem: And that's in the form of a motion?

Commissioner Musgrave: It is.

President Ungethiem: Do we have a second?

Commissioner Shoulders: I will second that, I appreciate the (Inaudible).

President Ungethiem: We have a motion and a second to table item D in the consent items, County Auditor, February 2018 Accounts Payable Voucher. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all of those in favor signify by saying aye.

All Commissioners: Aye.

President Ungethiem: Opposed?

(None opposed)

President Ungethiem: That motion carries.

(Motion approved 3-0)

Adjournment

President Ungethiem: That is everything on the list for today. Is there anything else to come before this Board today?

Commissioner Musgrave: Motion to adjourn.

President Ungethiem: Seeing none, we have a motion to adjourn. Do we have a second?

Commissioner Shoulders: Second.

(Motion approved 3-0)

President Ungethiem: We are adjourned.

(The meeting was adjourned at 3:26 p.m.)
