The John Henry Roelker House is significant for three reasons. First, the small dwelling is one of only two ante-bellum residences left in the Downtown. It is a solitary reminder of the manner of construction prevelant locally in the late-1850s before the advent of more pretentious architectural styles. Second, the dwelling had associations with an industry important to understanding the commerce of the city--namely iron work. Moreover, the foundry established by the property's builder behind his dwelling illustrated the evolution of the Downtown area from a locus containing varied land uses to one far more specialized and less industrial. The third basis of significance is the property's association with John Roelker, a successful early businessman and prominent local politician.

John Henry Roelker (b. 1816; Osnabruck, Hanover) was one of the smaller number of Germans to arrive in America before the first substantial wave of immigration in the late 1840s. Roelker landed in Maryland in 1835, making his way westward to Pittsburgh, Louisville and then St. Louis. By 1840, Roelker was living in Cincinnati's substantial German-born community and working for the first time in the stove business. His rise through the ranks of the foundry was gradual, but by 1854 he had accumulated enough capital "with savings as a result of his thrift and economy" to go out on his own. In that year he traveled to Evansville, where he had already begun assembling land in 1852. Roelker went through an early partnership and in 1858 became the senior partner of the Eagle Foundry, soon to be one of the city's most prosperous producers of stoves, hollow-ware, store and house fronts, and the like. The proprietorship of Eagle Foundry included one Henry Blount from 1860 to 1869, the same Henry Blount who retired from his successful iron plow business in about 1885 to live at his Washington, DC, residence, Dunbarton Oaks. Roelker's Eagle Foundry found success early in the history of the city's commerce as it tapped Evansville's growing markets in the South and West (principally, for Roelker, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, Arkansas, and Kansas). The city's selection as a Port of Entry in 1856 coincided with Roelker's ascendency and illustrated Evansville's hegemony in the

trade of the region.

The year that Roelker assumed senior partnership at Eagle Foundry was very likely the year in which he constructed his dwelling at the corner of Sycamore and Sixth streets. In February of 1858, Roelker purchased the land at the corner for \$600 from one of the men who may have recruited him to Evansville in the first place, Fred W. Brinkmeier, an early business partner. By 1860 (the next recorded assessment) the value assigned to land remained \$600 while the value of the improvement was listed as \$1500, the cost of a substantial dwelling in pre-war Evansville. The house has all of the physical characteristics indicative of mid-century construction: Gabled roof (instead of the later flat roof preferred for urban building lots); small scale; the arrangement of the facade into four bays; corbelling beneath the eaves; 6/6 windows; an open rear gallery; and old brick. An 1875 construction date for the dwelling rumored recently cannot be supported by any assessment or mortgage records, by the occupation of the person credited with the 1875 building date (a coachman), or by the probability of retarditaire building practices.

The Roelker House is the last intact vestige of Downtown buildings connected with the Wabash-Erie Canal, an enormous public project which rose and fell rapidly in the first half of the 19th century. A few industries such as the Eagle Foundry located on the canal route as it made its way down Fifth Street toward a terminal basin on the site of what would later become the Vanderburgh County Courthouse (1888-91). The canal never managed to make much difference in the success of Roelker's business, however, for it effectively closed in the 1860s. Neverthless, the canal project presents a significant social and economic event in the history of the city and state, and Roelker's house is virtually the last intact evidence of its existence in the Downtown.

Roelker himself was a significant personage in the history of the city, and his dwelling at Sixth and Sycamore is the only physical association left. His political contributions to the city and, to a lesser extent, the state, were considerable. True to the profile of early German immigrants, Roelker was a Republican. He served seven terms beginning in 1858--the year of his dwelling's construction= through 1872 as a member of the Evansville City Council. His involvement in local politics came at a time when city-wide seats were still being filled by non-Germans (a series of German mayors came to office beginning with the second wave of immigration in the 1880s) while ward representation was more closely allied withethnic groups. In 1881, Roelker was elected to the State Legislature as a representative from Vanderburgh County for one term. "He was an earnest republican," noted Roelker's obituary, "and might have been the recipient of higher honors from his party but preferred to give his whole time and attention to the development of his business in which he so magnificently succeeded."
